2.14. Significant Activities and contributions made by IQAC

Post Accreditation IQAC has taken series of steps to sustained quality measures on all the spheres that were considered to be important in quality maintenance.

1. The following Task Forces were reconstituted for including more number of members from constituent colleges. Details enclosed as **Annexure - 1**
2. The internal auditing team was constituted headed by the Vice Chancellor, Registrar, IQAC Co-ordinators, Academic Advisors and Senior Faculties. This committee visits every department and review functioning of the departments & faculty. Departments were given necessary directions in order to further taken quality measures post accreditations and overcome deficiencies/gaps that were identified by the NAAC peer team during their visit to the departments.
3. Research Re-orientation programme was organized at the central research facility in order to further facilitate participation of faculty to take-up research in emerging areas of health sciences. This year, more than 20 research projects (multi disciplinary - clinician, basic scientists and statisticians) were finalized.
4. Four new research centres were inaugurated during this period based on the recommendation of the IQAC.
5. As per the recommendations of the NAAC peer team committee, following actions were taken to overcome some of the deficiencies;
 - Faculties are encouraged to apply for extra mural funding for research activities.
 - Research methodology workshops, research certificate programmes are Certificate course in biostatistics, Certificate course in molecular techniques were started during 2015-16 to further enhance the research training for funding.
 - Several key dignitaries who are in leading key positions were invited to the campus for interacting with faculty and to upgrade the research facilities.
 - Research advisory board was reconstituted in order to make it more comprehensive to cover all the subjects offered by the University
 - a. University has this year applied for DM Neurology program
 - b. MCh in surgical oncology etc.
 - The number of books in the library were significantly increased (Minutes of the library committees is enclosed as **Annexure - 2**).

- Student feedback mechanism was strengthened and the student feedbacks are collected online and analyzed. Departments concerned are requested to take necessary action based on the feedback.
- Consultancy revenue generation was significantly increased and collaboration with institution and industry were also increased significantly enhances.
- The rural & urban health centres have started collecting epidemiological data on the outcome variable of communicable and non-communicable diseases of the community.
- Institution has started interpretation and identification of causes for development and implementation of interpretation strategies.
- The institution has developed software to collect and analyze all above data.
- Rural health care & development centre is actively involved in the activities carried out by the hospital.
- NABL accreditation process is now started and the pre-NABL audit is completed.
- The University and Medical College have conducted series of meetings to relate to NABH accreditations.
- Detailed proposal is now prepared for establishing Bio bank in the university.
- New MRI machine has been purchased in Department of Radiology.
- Cancer ward is upgraded with 60 beds and specialized clinicians (oncologists, onco surgeon, speech therapists etc.).
- Four new operation theatres commissioned during this year.
- All the OPD's have upgraded and patient waiting areas, equipment holding and new treatment areas have been credited.

4.2. Computerization of administration and library

The Library is computerized with library management software 'EASYLIB' that allows for bar-coding of the collection and keep records of the collection in all medias, keeps track of current arrivals (serials control) and circulation activities. Bar code labels have been pasted on the books and borrowers cards which facilitates online circulation. Users can access the online catalog which has been upgraded to the 'EPAC' from anywhere 24 x7 to know the resources available in the library. Author, title, editor, subject and keyword searches can be made in the EPAC.

Central library is a part of the campus-wide network connected by optic fibre cable network, supported by 1GBPS internet bandwidth. It is equipped with 34 computers to cater to the needs of faculty members, research scholars and students.

The library has taken several initiatives to provide Digital Library services to the users. It provides 24x7 access to a wide range of e-resources which includes e-books, e-journals and online databases through the EzProxy remote access program. Users can use the FedGate discovery tool to seamlessly search and access the various databases subscribed. Access to e-journals, e-books and online databases and all library resources is also available through the YENGAGE e-learning portal. Wi-Fi connectivity is available in the library reading halls, facilitating the users to use their lap-tops for uninterrupted access to the library resources. 25 desk-top computers are available for the users to access e-journals, e-books and online databases at the digital library. Printing, scanning, copying and downloading facilities are available for the students and faculty members.

5.13. Major grievances of students (if any) redressed:

- Most of the student studying in Yenepoya Nursing College and Yenepoya Physiotherapy College are from Kerala state.
- The food served was of general nature hence, students of these colleges had submitted a grievance regarding the composition of the food served to them.
- University has taken necessary action to rectify this by adding two more items (Sambar and Chatni) in the hostel mess menu.
- The water coolers supplied in the hostels were having contamination due to uneven cooling and non frequent maintenance.
- The grievances were redressed by rectifying the cooler and regular maintenance has made mandatory.
- New residential complex for staff and students with family was commissioned. The “Meridian Residents” complex is a free fabricated structure first of its kinds in India completed in record eight months time. It has 93 flats of double bed rooms and all amenities.

Based on the recommendation of the curriculum development committee, following new modules were the Advanced Comprehensive Clinical Training and Simulation Centre (ACTS-YEN), which is now implemented for UG and PG curriculum.

Feedback from students on curriculum was collected and analysed by the curriculum development committee.

6.3.2. Teaching and Learning

Expert Committee has been notified regarding starting of certificate course in HPE (Health Professional Education). Monthly lecture series are organised, by inviting guest faculty on the relevant topics. The topic for these lectures ranges from pedagogy to simulation.

The Centre for Health Professional Education regularly organizes workshops on Basic skills training, MCQ development, assessment tools, public speaking, conflict solving, integration of head and heart. This centre also publishes quarterly newsletter. This center also has collaborations with other Centres for Health Professional Education in the country for exchange of information, literature and advanced training.

Workshops on “Workplace Based Assessment” are conducted regularly. E-Learning portal “Yengage” which was developed in-house, was implemented systematically across all academic departments. The forum discussions are regularly held between faculty and students. The IT department has successfully implemented the Yengage E-Learning platform for Ph.D Program. Academic calendar is prepared and distributed among students as a hand book. Internal audit was conducted and several innovative teaching-learning methods were adopted and implemented.

YU-IOB Centre for Systems Biology and Molecular Medicine, Regenerative Medicine and Stem Cells Research Division were the new centres inaugurated with state-of-the art facility. Incentive program, seed grants, and reimbursement of publication charges schemes were revised and implemented. Research exchange program was introduced and Industrial research collaborations were introduced. Facilitated inter disciplinary proposal from clinical side for funding, research awards were initiated, IPM Cell was upgraded and 22 patents were applied, AMHS journal was listed in indexing services such as DOAJ and Index Copernicus. Institute was recognized as SIRO by DSIR, Govt. of India. 14 students were admitted for Ph.D Programme in this year.

615 research papers with impact factor ranging from 0.45 to 19.967 were publishes. The H-Index of the publications was 1-337 and 06 patents have been filed in this year. To facilitate research collaborations 14 MoU have been signed in the year. 11 PhD students have been awarded this year.

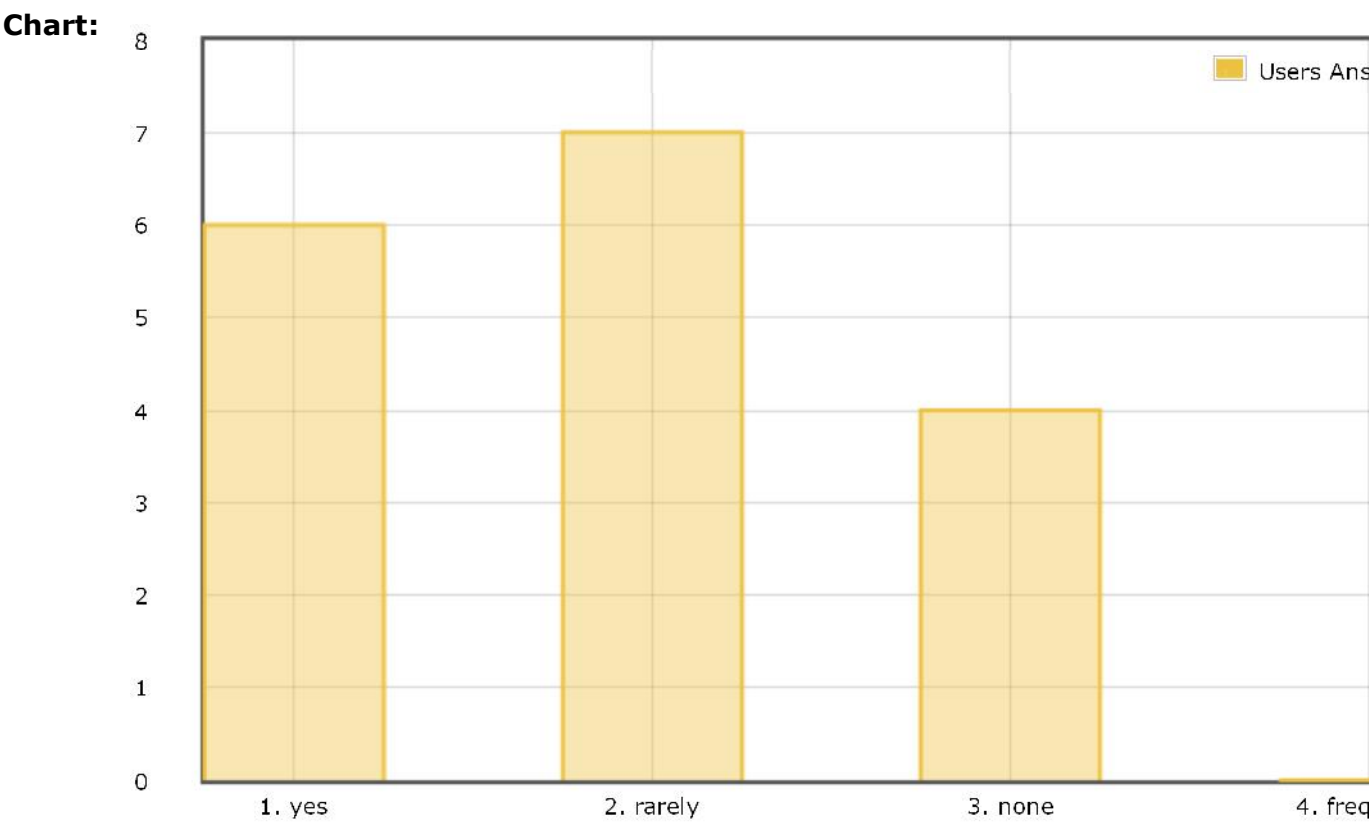

Based on the feedback analysis carried out by the team of experts, following actions were initiated to improve the teaching learning process.

- Class contents were uploaded to e-learning portal well in advance in order to improve the background understanding of the topic prior to delivering the course.
- Additional books were procured for the library in order to overcome any inadequacy in the number of copies available for reading. (Please see minutes of the library committee meeting-annexure-2)
- The teaching faculties were called for an interaction meeting with the principals, deans in order to effectively communicate curricular transaction with the students.
- The teachers who have found indifferent to the students, were asked to communicate more effectively with them.
- All the teachers were asked to provide feedback to the students & their performance in examinations.
- It was resolved to conduct more guest lectures in emerging areas in order to promote research interest among students.
- It was resolved that all students will be taken to other institutional labs, industries etc. in order to improve the effectiveness of the class room teaching.

Appendix - 5

Extension Activities and Institutional Social Responsibility (ISR)

Extension of curriculum from institutional level to community:

As per the regulations laid down by various national regulatory bodies, extension of part of curriculum to the community is an essential requirement. At YU sensitization on Institutional social responsibility is done through class room teaching as well as providing direct exposure to the community. Accordingly for MBBS, community medicine is one of the subjects. Similarly community dentistry and community health nursing components are prescribed in the curriculum. The constituent colleges of YU have made elaborate arrangements by way of infrastructure, faculty, support staff, learning resources etc. to enable these departments to carry out curricular activities to sensitize the students to community environment. During exposure to the community both students and faculty members are involved in health care delivery, health education, health check up camps and house to house visits. These activities not only give them the rationale for institutional social responsibility but also reinforcement of social welfare values and concepts.

Details of social outreach programmes undertaken by the university:

Centre for Rural Health Care and Development: YU is a minority institute and is located in panchayath area. It has the commitment to take medical education and health care delivery to the less privileged classes of the community. To satisfy this objective, University has started a dedicated Centre for Rural Health care and Development in addition to routine community departments of the constituent colleges. The centre is playing a pivotal role in sensitizing its faculty and students to the social responsibilities envisaged through certain unique programmes as detailed below.

- **Door to Door Health Care delivery Programme:**

University has established 26 Sub centers and 09 Dental rural centres in the rural and outreach areas in and around the campus. The 26 sub centres cover the entire population of the 10 Panchayaths and the centres concentrate on primary health care for those who require investigations and treatment beyond the primary care referred to the YMCH. While implementing this programme, it was noticed that many of the villagers were illiterate and under-privileged and did not understand the necessity of utilizing the services available for their health needs. They approach these centres only when they fall ill. To tide over this problem, the RHCD came out with a programme of Door to Door health care delivery where doctors, medical students and para- medicals form different groups make house to house visits, identify the public health problems faced by them and help them to solve these problems. This programme of health care delivery has been widely appreciated and 8006 people are benefited under this programme in this year.

- **Yen Health Care on Wheels:**

In spite of establishing 26 sub centres, we could identify some outreach areas where centres could not be established. For these areas the University conceived the idea of health care on wheels and titled it as 'Yen Health Care on wheels'. Ambulances and dedicated vehicles which are specifically designed, furnished and equipped to function as mobile medical and dental outpatient departments where groups of medical/ dental personals constituting of doctors, students, nurses and paramedics are posted on these mobile clinics, which visit these outreach areas and conduct clinics regularly and 1802 people are benefited under this programme in this year.

- **Training on Family Doctor System:**

In the context of globalization where health care delivery is highly complex and expensive YU considered introduction of family doctor system as a most effective method through which the country can ensure all the families are covered under the health care delivery system. Accordingly the University took a strategic decision to train its students on family doctor system. The Centre for Rural Health care Development in collaboration with Community Medicine and Public Health Dentistry has designed a programme where clusters of families in the outreach areas are assigned to group of students who will look after the health care requirements of these families thereby creating a mindset conducive to become family doctors of tomorrow.

- **Yen Health Cards:**

The patients referred by the personnel engaged in the family doctor systems and the patients referred through the aforesaid projects for advanced investigations and treatments are all provided with the Yen Health and Arogya cards which will enable them to avail these facilities either free or at heavily subscribed rates. 607 people are benefited under this programme in this year.

- **Routine activities:**

The routine activities conducted include Health screening camps, detection Camps, Immunization Camps, Treatment Camps, Blood donation camps etc. In last four years several such programmes have been organized by the departments of Community Medicine, The Centre for Rural Health Care and Development and Department of Medical Social Work.

Health Awareness Talks: Health awareness programmes are conducted at community level regarding various communicable diseases and methods of prevention regarding water and food borne disease like gastroenteritis, infective hepatitis, mosquito borne diseases like Dengue, Chickengunia, Malaria, Filaria etc. Emphasis is given with regard to the relationship between personal hygiene, environmental hygiene etc, with the maintenance of health. School health education programme to ensure that school children, parents and teachers are aware of good practice in maintaining the physical and mental health of children in a proper way and 4553 people are benefited under this programme in this year.

School Health Checkups: School health check-up programmes are being done in different schools in order to prevent malnutrition, underweight, anemia etc. 1154 students are benefited under this programme in this year.

Blood Grouping Camps: Blood grouping and blood check up camps are being done in different schools and colleges and in the sub centres. 1,953 people are benefited under this programme in this year.

Major Camps: Outreach activities like special medical camps in association with local organization, self help groups etc. are being done in all the sub centres. 1133 people are benefited under this programme in this year.

Immunization Programme: Pulse Polio immunization given for under 3year children during pulse polio immunization day. 295 people are benefited under this programme in this year.

The aforesaid activities have created remarkable impact on the social output of students and they themselves take the initiatives to constitute and organize their own program called Ashraya. Ashraya mobilizes funds through various activities (e.g., Art for Charity) and helping hand is extended to the suffering patients from the less privileged sections of the society.

Role of the university in promotion of neighborhood network and student engagement:

The University has also entered into MoU's with non- governmental organizations to provide services for specifically mentally and physically disadvantaged groups like mentally retarded children, psychiatric patients, physically challenged, orphans and destitute.

All the above said activities apart from ensuring health care delivery sensitizes the faculty and students to unique health problems faced by the village communities in the neighborhood and contributes to the holistic development of the students and thereby creating a new generation with a right attitude towards the rest privileged in the neighborhood. University through its various organs described has already pledged its commitments towards implementation of all the national health programmes and contribute to reach at the Millennium Development goals related to health care delivery.

The Department of Medical Social Work in collaboration with the department of Ophthalmology plays a major role in the implementation of National Programme on eradication of blindness in association with non-governmental service organization like Lions club international, rotary club etc. Regular monthly camps organized by the Medical Social Work department are used to train the interns in the curative health services to the poorer and disadvantaged section of the society. Regular camps on blindness detection, diabetes, cancer detection etc. are conducted by the University for building a healthy society by giving easy access to the modern healthcare.

Dental trauma awareness programme: conducted in schools around Mangalore where a large number of locals along with students have benefitted (Auto rickshaw driver, bus drivers, social workers, physical trainers, play home staff etc.). Blood check up camps for detection of Anemia, Diabetes, Malaria and Filariasis with facilities for routine blood investigation and blood grouping; School health check up programme for early detection of diseases and timely treatment and prevention of diseases through well planned immunization programme are contributing to build and strengthen interface between the University and the neighborhood community.

Students and faculty in extension activities:

NSS was established by the University in 2010 and at present has 5 Units distributed among the four constituent colleges. Every unit organizes its activities under the established norms of NSS namely, regular activities and special camps. Under the regular activities in collaboration with the Centre for Rural Health care and Development, NSS has organized several medical camps and awareness programmes and adopted villages for comprehensive health care delivery. As part of these activities NSS has focused on the less privileged sections of the society like physically challenged, mentally retarded and those with visual and hearing impairments etc. Mechanical Aids and wheel chairs were procured and distributed to these unfortunate ones. Special camps were also arranged to sensitize the students to mental and physical problems faced by the people living in tribal areas high range. Camps for National Integration are conducted in campus and in selected localities around the campus. NSS volunteers are actively involved in the activities of the **Centre for Environmental Studies** in the green auditing of Flora and Fauna of the University Campus and help in

keeping the green campus and clean doing full justice to the concept of **Swacch Bharath**. As part of this exercise, NSS had erected sign boards displaying the relevance of prevention of substance and maintenance of personal and environmental cleanliness in and around the society.

University has created dedicated Centre for the Prevention of Substance abuse apart from declaring the campus substance free. NSS and Youth Red Cross organized several programs on the deleterious effects alcohol, tobacco, ganja and drugs. The Centre also conducts awareness programmes in the neighboring educational institutions and voluntary organizations for students, teachers and members. Under **Youth Red Cross**, University has a red ribbon club that has created a list of student blood donors with their blood groups. The red ribbon club provides donors at the time of necessity in a systematic way.

Smile Train Programme:

University in collaboration with Smile Train, USA and Germany has established a dedicated **Centre for the Craniofacial Anomalies**. These anomalies which include cleft lip and palate and spectrum of complex craniofacial anomalies are always been a treatment challenge where various specialists namely, Oral and Maxillofacial Surgeons, Plastic Surgeons, Neurosurgeons, ENT Surgeons, Ophthalmologists, were to be coordinated depending on the nature of Anomaly. This could be solved to a great extent through the emergence of a dedicated specialty namely craniofacial surgery. YU has been fortunate enough to have well qualified and competent team of specialists in these complex interdisciplinary areas for thousands of unfortunate patients at a totally free of cost with the help of Smile Train.

The Centre has already come out with a post- doctoral programme in this interdisciplinary area for surgeons from different specialties like oral and maxillofacial surgery, plastic surgery, ENT etc. to specialize in the surgery of acquired and congenital craniofacial anomalies. ICMR has recognized this centre as one of the National Centres for treating Craniofacial Anomalies.

Institution also actively participates in the programmes of national importance namely pulse polio programme, breast feeding programme, vector borne disease control programme, HIV/AIDS programme, blindness control programme, nutrition programmes etc. Institution also observes all the important days and weeks outlined by WHO, Union of India, Govt. of Karnataka. Yenepoya Institutions under YU have collaboration with various government departments for specific purposes which include:

- YMCH and Hospital collaborate with the District Health and Family Welfare Department in organizing health care education and also in epidemic control in the designated taluks of D.K. District depending on need.
- YMCH extends services to the public through ICTC (Integrated Counseling & Testing Centre) for voluntary blood testing for detection of HIV which is established by Karnataka State Aids Prevention Society.
- DOTS Centre under RNTCP of Government of India is also function at YMCH which provides free testing and dispensing of drugs for treatment of Tuberculosis.
- With a vision to make cataract free zone YMCH with financial grant from District Blindness Control Society is undertaking cataract screening and surgery camps in the 12 PHCs in Mangalore and Bantwal Taluks allotted by the DBCS of Dakshina Kannada.

- To further women and child health YMCH has joined hands with Nirmala Charitable Hospital Ullal by posting specialists and PGs in OBG and Paediatrics disciplines on regular basis.
- YMCH collaborate with the District Child Welfare Committee of Dakshina Kannada (CWC) in conducting health check up programme at fixed intervals in the six Orphanages affiliated CWC in Mangalore Taluk.
- YMCH collaborate with the District Health and Family Welfare Department in organizing monthly health check up clinics in Community Health Centre Moodbidri for the families affected from Endosulphan spray.
- YMC collaborates with the District Health and Family Welfare Department of Dakshina Kannada for conducting MBBS rural posting in Kotekar and Kurnad PHCs.
- YMCH collaborate with the District Health and Family Welfare Department in compulsory immunization, pulse polio, family planning and control of communicable diseases.

Details of research or extension work undertaken by the institution to ensure social justice and empower the underprivileged and the most vulnerable sections of society:

Medical Social Work department in the hospital is actively involved in extension activities like conducting awareness programmes, medical camps, screening camps, immunization camps, treatment camps, blood donation camps etc. In addition, in collaboration with the department of Hospital Administration conducts radio and Television programmes on health promotion and prevention of diseases. The outreach programmes namely Door to Door Health Care Delivery, Health Care on Wheels, Training on Family doctor System, Yen Health Card Programmes etc implemented through the Centre for Rural Health Care and Development are also contributing to social justice and empowerment of the underprivileged.

Community Medicine Dept. also conducts awareness programs, screening camps, immunization camps, treatment camps etc. apart from rehabilitation initiatives and research activities mentioned above. For these activities in the rural areas the department has dedicated rural centres and an urban health centre specifically for the sake of the less privileged poor in the society.

Public Health Dentistry also has 7 peripheral centres to coordinate their extension activities in the rural and outreach areas. This centre also demonstrates its responsibility of bringing up the new generation with appropriate oral health through camps conducted in the nursery and primary level schools. The department of Pedodontics also joins with Department of Public Health Dentistry in carrying out these activities directed towards maintaining the oral health among school going children.

Community Health Nursing: Community and family based Nursing Care is a new area being introduced in the nursing. Accordingly, they also join the University's endeavour to take health care profession and health care delivery to the community at a family level. 52 awareness camps, rehabilitation camps, jatha (rally), road shows, runs etc were conducted at this end. To help the physically challenged people, University has come out with different programmes through NSS and NGOs like Smile Train. While NSS mainly concentrates on locomotors hearing and visual disabilities, department of Craniofacial Surgery in collaboration with Smile Train takes care of craniofacial anomalies. 2500 complex craniofacial anomalies are corrected surgically as a collaborative endeavour during

the last two years totally free of cost. The centre has started two postdoctoral programmes to bring up a new speciality as a separate entity so that the different process of coordinating different specialists for the surgical treatment or a single surgical intervention can avoid further complexities in the future. This centre has conducted several community based programs to create awareness regarding the availability of free treatment for those unfortunate children with such deformities and should be appraised about the necessity of resort into the treatment at the right time.

Mechanism for tracking the students' involvement in various social movements/activities that promotes citizenship roles:

Student involvement in various community and educational based service activities is closely monitored by the faculty. University has a system of conveying departmental meetings where the curriculum is critically reviewed and the student participation in community based activities is discussed in detail. Participation in activities that promote citizenship roles among students is part of the curriculum and attendance is mandatory. To monitor the student involvement in community based activities organized by the Centre for Rural Health care and Development, MSW Dept., NSS and Youth Red Cross a very effective mentorship programme is in place where the students are divided into small groups and it is the responsibility of the mentor faculty to ensure adequate participation of the students in all social movements and activities that promote citizenship roles. In general we found an overwhelming participation of students in implementing a spectrum of projects being implemented either as part of curriculum or as a part of beyond the curriculum projects.

To enable the students to play citizenship roles, the University observes several national and international days like World environmental day, No tobacco day, World health days etc. In connection with these days, street plays, skit, walkathon, marathon, quiz, debate etc. are conducted and add-on courses are offered to mould each student through personality development, including sessions on behavioral and social skill, so as to enable him/her to play his/her roles as a good citizen of this country. The University has a dedicated Centre for Environmental Studies to sensitize the students to the emerging threats to the environment and to prevent them. Add on course is offered in this regard as prescribed by the UGC.

Involvement of the community in its outreach activities and contribution to community development by the University:

Wide spectrums of community based activities have been initiated to take healthcare education and health care delivery to the rural and outreach areas and thereby contribute to community development. Centre for RHCD, Dept. of MSW, NSS, Youth Red Cross play a major role to ensure the involvement of the community in these outreach activities. The starting of 26 sub-centres in our reach areas, starting of 6 dental peripheral centres, initiation of house to house health care delivery programme, initiation of health care on wheels programme, initiation of the training programme in family doctor system etc. stands eloquent testimony to the endeavors made by the University to ensure the involvement of the community in the outreach areas. The following activities are being carried out on a regular basis in the vicinity of the institution, surrounding areas of Dakshina Kannada and also neighbouring districts such as Hassan, Chickmagalur, Shivamogga, Davanagere, Chitradurga and Kasargod districts by the respective departments/Institutions.

1. Community Medicine
2. Public Health Dentistry
3. Community Health Nursing of YNC
4. Physiotherapy
5. Rural Health Care and Development Project (RHCDP)
6. Medical Social Work
7. Ophthalmology
8. NSS

1. Community Medicine:

The following activities are conducted:

- Razia Rural Health Care and Training Centre at Harekala is functioning under the supervision of department of Community Medicine of YMCH. This hospital is catering to the health needs of about 50,000 populations. Inpatient and outpatient facility, dental and physiotherapy services are made available to the public through this hospital. 750 families are covered under 100% free treatment facility at YMC Hospital in collaboration with Hydrose Haji Charitable Trust Harekala. Weekly clinics, health education, implementation of national programmes like pulse polio, malaria control, TB control, sanitation in selected clusters are conducted through this hospital.
- YMC has taken up an innovative programme of village adoption for total health care. Accordingly Kotepura ward of Ullal Municipality has been adopted where a sub centre under RHCD provides free health check up facility for the community.
- Regular health check up in the two orphanages affiliated to Child Welfare Committee (CWC) of Dakshina Kannada.
- Urban Health Centre at Bunder Mangalore catering to the health needs of Bunder, Kudroli, and Bengare population through outpatient services, health camps, health education and implementation of national programmes.
- Postings of PGs to conduct weekly clinics at Balepuni Satellite Centre & department conducted 25 extension activities in this year.

Public Health Dentistry:

Dept. Public health dentistry of YDC which is the key link between the college and the community has been undertaking number of dental health care programmes since the establishment of the YDC. Key programmes are,

- Dental check up and treatment camps in the community with support from local service organizations.
- School dental screening camps.
- Dental education programme through talks, video shows, posters and exhibitions.
- Rural Dental Satellite Centres with support from NGOs and Institutions.
- Department conducted 291 dental camps in this year.

Community Health Nursing of YNC:

The department administers rural postings of students in the selected villages at regular intervals. Health education, health screening camps and celebration of national programmes are being conducted through interdepartmental coordination.

Yenepoya Physiotherapy College:

YPC plays a key role in extending physiotherapy activities in the village community through rural postings of students in the selected villages and shelter homes; health education, disability screening camps, free distribution of rehabilitative aides and celebration of national days with the involvement of students, interns and PGs. The YPC runs physiotherapy clinics at Olavinahalli Social Service Centre for the benefit of the inmates of Old Age Home

RHCDC

YU is implementing a separate project titled **RHCD** in the vicinity of the campus. The following activities are conducted in the selected village clusters:

- Sub centres – regular health screening clinics
- Coordinating family focused health care by MBBS and BDS students
- Health education camps
- Celebration of national events
- Implementation of national programmes like pulse polio, malaria control, TB control, leprosy eradication etc.
- School health programme - health check up, counseling, health talks
- Health cards for unprivileged populations
- Conduct research studies on topics of significance
- Linkages with local governance bodies, NGOs and associations for issue based collaboration.
- RHCDC conducted 782 Door to Door Healthcare Delivery Programmes, 49 Health Awareness Talks, 17 School Health Check Ups, 39 Blood Grouping and Blood Sugar Check Ups, 22 Health Check Up at Orphanages, 02 Immunization Programme, 34 Rehabilitation Activities, 37 Detection Camp, 70 Treatment Camp, 95 Yen Health Care on Wheels in this year.

Medical Social Work Department

- Coordination of camps – Medical, Dental, Ophthalmology, blood donation, diabetes detection in the semi urban and rural areas ongoing basis.
- Coordination of weekly clinics at Balepuni Satellite Centre
- Coordination of monthly health check up clinics in collaboration with District Family Welfare and Family Planning department of Dakshina Kannada and CHC Mudbidri for the Endosulphan affected families.
- Coordination of Yen-Sahayog initiative of YMCH to extend health care on free basis to Old Age homes, Psycho-Social Rehabilitation Centres and Residential schools. At present 31 NGOs, 9 residential schools in Dakshina Kannada, Uttara Kannada, Kasargod and Kannur districts.
- Implementation of Blindness Control Programme in the 12 PHCs allotted by the District Blindness Control Society of District Health and Family Welfare department.
- Coordination of regular health check up in the four orphanages affiliated to Child Welfare Committee (CWC) of Dakshina Kannada.
- Rehabilitation support to needy patients and clients in the community through mobilizing local resources.
- Assistance in epidemic control and health education programmes conducted by colleges/departments of YU.
- Assistance in popularizing various patient friendly health programmes like Yen-Arogya in the community with the intention of reaching out to vulnerable sections in the

society.

- Medical Social Work department conducted 48 Medical Camps, 11 School Screening Camps, 30 Blood Donation Camps, 12 Ophthal Camps, 50 Balepuni Satellite Centre (Camp) in this year.

Ophthalmology:

- Coordination of Blindness Control Programme in the 12 PHCs allotted by the District Blindness Control Society of District Health and Family Welfare department.
- Observance of days like National Blindness Control, National Eye Donation etc.
- Blindness Screening camps in the community.
- School Children Eye Screening camps
- Health Education.
- 280 patients covered under this programmes in this year.

NSS Unit: NSS has taken up national integration as a priority area and motivates the students to actively take part in the national integration camps. NSS also conducts cultural programmes in association with various national and international voluntary organizations like South Indian Cultural Centre, Folklore Academy, where artists from other parts of India come out with their native form of arts.

Overall development of students:

Mentorship programme: Under the mentorship programme, a group of 15 to 20 students belonging to both Urban and Rural areas and belonging to different communities are brought under a faculty mentor. The mentor identifies the academic, and social and the language gaps found between the rural and urban areas bridge courses are conducted. The University has also started an add-on course READY programme, for the holistic development of the students, which directly promotes the overall development of students from rural and tribal backgrounds. The students from rural backgrounds are provided free seats, free accommodation, free food, book bank facility, empowerment programmes and employment after accomplishment of degree and entrepreneurship placement through UIIC.

Social-justice:

Ashraya: To promote social justice and good citizenship among the students, University initiated a programme namely Ashraya to motivate the students to develop the right attitude towards the less privileged sections of the society. Ashraya mobilizes funds in different ways to the needy patients seeking services of YMCH. The fund mobilization was first started in the hostels by bucket collection method at hostel and registered as charitable organization in 2003. Apart from the benefit to the patients the Ashraya also promotes feeling of social justice and good citizenship among its students.

Training on Family doctor system: Under this programme clusters of students are made in-charge of clusters of families living in the rural and outreach areas. Apart from catering to the health care requirements of these families the programme could inculcate a feeling of brotherhood with the poorest of the poor leaving in the villages of India and could season them to respond positively in meeting the health care requirements of these people and thereby promoting their sense of social justice and good citizenship.

Centre for RHCD: Through the activities of the centre namely health care on wheels, door to door health care delivery programme etc. the students are sensitized to the health care

challenges faced in the rural population of India and thereby promoting social justice and good citizenship among them.

Dept. of MSW conducts various types of camps in the rural areas which are specifically connected with the extension programmes of various departments of Ophthalmology, Paediatrics etc. They also take the students and familiarize them to the sad conditions in which the rural populations of India live.

Substance Free Campus: University has declared the campus as totally substance free and created a dedicated centre namely, Centre for Substance abuse Prevention. The centre has conducted 20 awareness programmes against various substances like alcohol, tobacco and drugs. Placards are displayed in the campus with slogans of preventing tobacco and alcohol in the campus and this is being strictly implemented with the help of mentors and faculty.

Environmental Consciousness: University has been meticulously orienting our students to become environment conscious through various programmes organized by University Centre for Environmental studies. Accordingly several awareness programmes on Global Warming, Waste disposal including solid waste disposal, liquid waste disposal, and biomedical waste disposal. University has elaborate facility to handle this waste and minimize the impact. The Liquid wastes are treated through STP and ETP and the effluent water after treatment is used for Gardening and Flushing purposes. The solid waste, after outsourcing the biomedical waste for disposal, all other waste including organic waste including food waste, garbage, dry leaves are subjected to vermi-composting and the compost is distributed for agriculture purposes. In this way we have already proved to our students that nothing can be considered as waste and the so called waste if properly collected and treated can be recycled effectively. Special classes are arranged by the Centre for Environmental Studies on all these aspects. The centre also conducts green auditing of the campus systematically collecting the spectrum of flora and fauna in the campus in which the students take an active role.

To make sure that the personality of the student imbibes all the qualities of the good citizen, university conducts a unique programme called Ready programme, where interactive sessions are conducted by experts to impart all the qualities of the good citizenship into the young minds. The Student Welfare Department and the NSS units conduct special programmes on national integration, value system, human rights etc. apart from conducting various cultural programmes to strengthen the affective domain of the student with deliberate intention of molding them into ideal and good citizens of tomorrow. To create intimacy and affection to the suffering patients, from the second year onwards specific number of beds are allotted to each student who prepares his case for presentation before the faculty and at the same time groom them into matured health care provider with the qualities of an ideal citizen/doctor. All such activities are planned and executed with wholehearted cooperation of faculty and other staff.

Institutional alignment itself with the annual themes/programs of WHO/ICMR:

University has made it a regular practice to observe various days on relevant health themes like World Aids Day, World Health Day, Mental Health Day and Week, No Tobacco Day, Doctors Day, World Nursing Day, Breast feeding week, Nutrition week etc. There is a theme associated with each day and week. University arranges panel discussions and invited lectures on these themes and takes up the challenges in the themes for further follow-up. Several students and faculty projects are undertaken in the thematic areas outlined by ICMR.

Role of the institution in the following extension activities

*** Community outreach health programs for prevention, detection, screening, management of diseases and rehabilitation by cost effective interventions:**

The routine programmes consisting of awareness creation programme, screening/detection camps, treatment camps, immunization camps, and rehabilitation endeavours and unique programmes like door to door health care delivery programme, health care on wheels, immunization programme, training programme on family doctor system, Health Card distribution, are meant for prevention, detection, screening, management of diseases and rehabilitation totally free of cost or provided at highly subsidized rates. These services can be described as cost effective.

- Awareness creation regarding potable water supply, sanitation and nutrition.
- Awareness creation regarding water-borne and air-borne communicable diseases.
- Awareness creation regarding non-communicable diseases - cardiovascular diseases, diabetes, cancer, mental health, accident and trauma, etc.
- Awareness creation regarding the role of healthy life styles and physical exercise for promotion of health and prevention of diseases.
- Awareness creation has always been an integral part of our extension activities carried out by different agencies of the University.
- Awareness creation regarding AYUSH Systems of medicines in general and / or any system of medicine in particular.
- Complementary and alternative medicine.
- Pharmaco economic evaluation in drug utilization.

YU has been so far running academic programmes on modern medicine, nursing and allied health sciences. But, now the University has considered the possibility of diversifying the areas of specialization to the systems of Alternative medicine as well. Accordingly, plans have been prepared to establish a Yenepoya Homeopathic and Ayurveda College and Hospital. Several awareness creation programmes have been conducted for our faculty and students on the alternative systems of medicine. In addition to awareness creation, our academic departments and University research center has been conducting some integrated research programmes. University has not taken any decision on starting any academic programme in AYUSH areas apart from the collaborative research already mentioned.

Hospital information system covers entire hospital including the pharmacy. Periodic evaluation of the drug utilization from Pharmaco-economic point of view is undertaken to make the treatment cost effective. A drug policy including antibiotic policy has been evolved by the hospital administration and a drug formulary has been created with cost effective and high quality brands of all important molecules. The department of Hospital Administration makes a systematic review on the judicious utilization of the drugs using the data available through the Hospital Information Systems periodically.

*** Participation in national programs like Family Welfare, Mother and Child Welfare, Population Control, Immunization, HIV/AIDS, Blindness control, Malaria, Tuberculosis, School Health, anti tobacco campaigns, oral health care, etc. and Promotion of mental health and prevention of substance abuse.**

University has taken extra care to extend the medical education and health care delivery to the community and the family level. In that process importance is given to implement National Health Programmes like Family Welfare, Mother and Child Welfare etc. In fact the unique programmes initiated as beyond the syllabus academic activity is a training programme on the Family Doctor System to groom the next generation of health care providers well trained on family doctor system, which is the only method of ensuring health care delivery and welfare at the family level including mother and child welfare. University centres like centre for Rural Health Care and Development and Department of Medical Social Work along with the academic departments like ophthalmology, dermatology, OBG, General Medicine, Chest Medicine etc. all play their due roles in the implementation of National Health Programmes like Blindness control, HIV AIDS, Malaria, TB, and Population Control etc. The Center for Rural Health Care Development and Dept. of MSW along with Paediatrics and Pedodontics conduct regular dental and general health check-ups in different schools, destitute homes, orphanages etc. Anti-tobacco campaigns is one the main programmes adopted by the Center for Prevention of Substance Abuse. University has established 6 dental peripheral health care centres apart from various camps conducted in other areas as mentioned. As recognition to our commitment towards oral health care the Head of the department of Public Health Dentistry has been chosen by the Govt. of Karnataka as the special officer to evolve a comprehensive oral health policy for Govt. of Karnataka.

Mental health remains to be one of the major challenges to be addressed in the field of health care delivery. While the indicators related to the physical health have all shown improvement, mental health has been deteriorated. While physical health problems like infant mortality, maternal mortality, problems due to infectious diseases etc. are faced by developing countries, mental health issues are the burning problems in the developed world. University has already recognized the increased incidences of mental health problems in the society and has evolved different programmes and personnel to handle the additional burden in addition to the functioning of the mandatory department of Psychiatry. The department of Psychiatry has a clinical psychology branch that handles patients with a spectrum of mental health problems below the level of psychiatric illness. The department of Paediatrics also has a Child Psychology wing headed by a highly acclaimed faculty in psychology. All these units conduct several awareness programmes apart from offering counselling sessions in consultation with qualified psychiatrist in the psychiatry department. Already the department has PG and doctoral programmes in Psychiatry and related areas. Now the department has come out with a new post- doctoral certificate programme on Psychiatric rehabilitation in collaboration NIMHANS Bangalore.

It has been observed that one of the worst problems that the present generation faces is the mental health problems associated with the substance abuse and addiction. The peaceful atmosphere of the educational institutions is often adversely affected by a small group of students who are habituated or addicted to the substances, including alcohol and drugs. Understanding the need of the time, University took a policy decision to create a dedicated centre to create awareness and thereby to prevent substance abuse. The Center for Prevention of Substance Abuse has conducted several awareness programmes and conduct research activities which have resulted in publications of 03 papers. The Center has declared the University campus as substance free campus.

- **Adoption of population in the geographical area for total health care:**

As an institution deemed to be University situated in the Village panchayath, University has taken up the responsibility of reaching a target of health for all in the geographical areas surrounding the University by 2020. To achieve this target at the inception itself University

has created a dedicated centre that established 26 sub-centres in these areas and adopted 10 villages for total health care.

- **Research or extension work to reach out to marginalized populations.**

All the extension activities are carried out by various units of the University namely, Centre for Rural Health Care and Development, Department of Medical Social Work, NSS, Community Departments, YRC etc. are aimed at marginalized populations living in the rural and outreach areas. Now the Centre for Rural Health Care and Development has come out with various community based research programs on communicable and non- communicable diseases in collaboration with the Community Medicine department of the University.

- **Participation of faculty members in community health awareness programs:**

Yes. Faculty plays the most important role as resource persons and organizers in the various types of community health awareness programs as detailed in different stages and sections.

- **Institutional participation in National program for prevention and control of diseases:**

YU through its constituent institutions takes active participation in the implementation of national programmes for prevention and control of diseases. This is done mainly through awareness generation programmes and extending services through opening of government supported patient support units in the YMCH. Such units include:

DOTS: is a community programme of prevention and treatment of Tuberculosis. The unit is managed by the Department of Pulmonary Medicine. The patients are being referred from Primary Health Centers in and around Mangalore.

District Tuberculosis Center- Collaborates with Dept. of Pulmonary Medicine for the implementation of the RNTCP), Govt. of India. Students are regularly posted to the RNTCP unit that provides exposure to a spectrum of Tuberculosis related problems like MDRTB and XDRTB.

ICTC: Integrated Counseling and Testing Centre under the supervision of District Health and family Care Officer is functioning in the Dept. of OBG providing testing and counseling services for prevention of HIV transmission from mother to child. ICTC also conducts awareness programme for the general public.

Immunization clinics:

Departments of Paediatrics and Community Medicine conduct free immunization clinics (DPT, BCG, Polio etc.) both in the tertiary care hospital as well as in the rural and urban health centers.

Extension of services during epidemic outbreak:

YMC is an active collaborator with District Health and Family Welfare Department striving for the control of diseases during epidemic outbreaks (dengue, malaria, chikungunya etc.) in the district. Health education, blood smear test, clinics are part of such interventions.

Blindness control:

Dept. of Ophthalmology with support from Dept. of MSW conducts regular eye screening camps in the remote villages as part of national blindness control programme. Recognizing this service District Blindness Control Society has allotted 12 PHCs to YMCH for organizing

eye screening camps with support from the respective PHCs and to perform cataract surgeries on patients identified through these camps in the tertiary care hospital. In addition to this awareness is created on importance of eye donation during the eye donation awareness fortnight observed from August 25th to Sept 8th every year.

Simulation centre aims at helping the beginners to mitigate errors and maintain safety. By providing complete virtual environment, ACTS YEN provides reproducible and on demand access to patients and clinical experience resulting in more skilled and safe training.

This unique centre is housed in the vast place covering 5000 sq feet at Emergency Medicine Department with state of art infrastructure. It is also well equipped with unique facilities including: Anatomage Table, a technological masterpiece, very first in India, offering an opportunity to learn anatomy in a unique manner. This Centre is a unique and the largest state of the art simulation facility in India with the current version simulators.

High Fidelity Simulators, a brilliant technology that can mimic anatomy and hemodynamic physiology of human body helping detailed virtual learning. The centre houses a variety of high fidelity simulators including infant, paediatric, adult and maternal fetal simulator. As added features, it can also imitate clinical and medical conditions such as heart attack, shock, trauma and many more.

In addition, Centre also contains virtual reality simulators like endoscopy trainer, laparoscopy trainer, cathlab, ultra sound, ophthalmic viewers allowing the surgeons to practice skills to perform invasive surgeries including cardiac valve replacements, transthoracic ultra sound and many more. This unique initiative was Yenepoya's stepping stone towards excellence to enable graduates, post graduates, degree students practicing general physicians, specialists to attain perfection in their technique resulting in optimum safety and satisfaction.

ADVANCED COMPREHENSIVE CLINICAL TRAINING AND SIMULATION CENTER (ACTS-YEN)

This is a unique Centre and the largest state of the art simulation facility in the country with the current version simulators. Yenepoya University Simulation Centre was conceptualised in 2016. ACTS- YEN is a major step towards Yenepoya University's vision of providing and promoting excellence in clinical care, competency based health professions education, ethical student training and paving the road towards improved patient care, safety and satisfaction.



BENEFITS OF SIMULATION TRAINING

Integrating simulation, in graduate and post graduate curriculum, should facilitate more ethical training with least harm and discomfort to patient. Multi-disciplinary & team training for emergency situations will result in better team dynamics, communication and behavioural skills and more realistic training.

Simulation based learning helps to mitigate errors and maintain safety in medical field where there is zero tolerance for any deviation from the Standard protocols. It provides opportunity for training to be conducted for inter-professional team of health providers rather than in

isolation. The simulation centre - ACTS YEN provides reproducible and on-demand access to patients and clinical experiences through the simulators and task trainers.



FACILITIES OFFERED AT ACTS YEN



The centre is housed in the Emergency Medicine Department Building on the 8th floor. It boasts of a state of the art infrastructure, centrally air conditioned complex spread over more than 5,000 square feet, well equipped with a wide range basic task trainers to high fidelity mannequins, Anatomage and virtual reality simulators, an indoor auditorium with capacity of 250 and two debriefing rooms.

The Anatomage Table - A technological masterpiece - *Anatomage*, offers an opportunity to learn anatomy in a very different & unique manner. It provides three dimensional virtual dissection of the human body. It is also a powerful radiology workstation, tool for surgical & pathological case review.

High fidelity simulators incorporate computerised mannequins that closely mimic anatomy & hemodynamic physiology of a human body. The centre houses a variety of high, intermediate and low fidelity simulators including infant, paediatric, adult (Metiman and HPS) and Maternal Fetal simulator. These can imitate clinical and medical conditions such as heart attack, shock, trauma, normal & difficult labour, post partum haemorrhage, drug overdose just to name a few . The mannequins respond to drugs, procedures (like intubation) and actual equipment (like defibrillator). Advanced resuscitation equipment, medications, anaesthetic gases and imaging monitor display capability are some of the essentials incorporated into the design of the Simulation Centre.

The **Virtual Reality Simulators** like endoscopy trainer, laparoscopy trainer, cathlab, ultra sound, Ophthalmic and Otosopic viewers allows trainees or surgeons to practice procedural skills to perform minimally invasive surgeries, including bronchoscopes, upper and lower gastrointestinal endoscopies, cardiac valve replacements, transthoracic ultra sound and so on. The **blue phantoms** mannequins allow training for regional anaesthesia.

Beneficiaries include health professional – graduates, post graduates, degree or diploma students to practicing general physicians, specialists and super specialists, nursing faculty as well as Para-medical members of team as well as health professionals

ACTIVITIES AT ACTS-YEN

1. Simulation based teaching is carried out on regular basis for undergraduates, postgraduates and Interns.



2. Faculty Development training are conducted by visiting resource faculties like Dr Marraro from Italy and Dr Anand Hinduja from Mumbai.



3. Workshops are conducted by different departments on monthly basis for Interns, PG's, nursing staffs, etc.



4. Intern Exit Exam is carried out and we have around 10-11 departments OSCE and evaluating them based on their clinical skills.

5. Simulation based classes for school students from Manipal School were conducted here at ACTS-YEN on Reproductive health.



6. BLS Programs are conducted on a weekly basis for nursing staffs, technicians, lift operators, housekeeping staffs, ambulance drivers both from our university and other institutions.

Also, BLS Program was conducted for the Fire brigadiers from nearby Fire stations.

Preamble: Age related problems of geriatric population were unnoticed until they sought treatment for cardiac problems, Stroke, fractures etc., which leads to prolonged hospitalization and related complications. If the risks could be identified earlier a preventive program may help to lead a healthy life. This centre will work to identify the risks of injuries and promote health to lead an active life.

Objectives

1. To identify the high risk geriatric population.
2. To create awareness about the risk and preventive measures to promote health in geriatric population.
3. To increase outreach services of the department

Following training programmes will be conducted to meet the objectives.

1. Endurance training
2. Strength training

- Visiting the old age homes and the nearby residential areas to fix appointments for screening.
- Identification of high risk persons.

- Education about the risk factors
- Making groups for training session
- Training sessions will be conducted in following places
 1. Physiotherapy Out Patient Department
 2. Old age homes
 3. Identified Common places in the community.

Phase III:

- Training sessions and follow ups.

BENEFICIARIES: Senior citizens staying in and around Mangalore.

BENEFITS FOR THE COLLEGE:

- There is no structured geriatric Physiocare centre in Mangalore hence Yenepoya Physiotherapy college will be the first one to launch such centre.
- Centre does not require additional faculty recruitment or space.
- Needs fund only for the preparation of educational and advertisement materials.
- Students will get exposure to geriatric rehabilitation.
- Cultivate social responsibility of the students

DIRECTORATE OF RURAL HEALTH CARE AND DEVELOPMENT CENTRE

Objectives:

The center was established with the goal of offering comprehensive health promoting and preventive services in the rural community.

1. To make health care services available and affordable to the community.
2. To implement national health programmes.
3. To educate the community regarding health promotion and disease prevention.
4. To establish a referral system to the tertiary health care institution for further management.
5. To facilitate clinical training of graduates and post graduates in the community.
6. To train doctors as family health care providers.
7. To bring up healthy and knowledgeable generation of India.

Context:

Rural Health care is one of biggest challenges facing India. With more than 70 percent population living in rural areas and low level of health facilities, mortality rates due to diseases are on a high. Considering the picture of grim facts of scarce resources and inaccessible health care services in rural areas, there is a dire need of new practices and processes to ensure that quality and timely healthcare reaches the deprived corners of the Indian villages.

Prosperity, progress and development of any nation depend upon the nation's ability to acquire, produce, access and use pertinent information. A report on older people (2008:3) reported that empowering the local people with information will enable them to maintain active and independent lives. Access to information is also critical to letting people know their entitlements to welfare benefits and sources of support to overcome social exclusion.

RHCDC has established 27 sub centres with an objective of taking healthcare delivery to rural and outreach areas in the outskirts of Yenepoya University. Under this programme, a team of medical personnel consisting of a doctor/intern, medical social worker and a staff nurse visit the house at regular intervals, examine the people, record Blood Pressure, collect samples for routine blood test, blood sugar and other investigations depending on the indications.

The Practice

The center has various satellite sub centers catering to the health needs of the community in different areas by conducting regular health check up, blood investigations like blood

grouping, random blood sugar and health education sessions. Home visits by the paramedical staff along with the trainee doctors and medical officer will help them to understand the social determinants of health and disease. This will also generate a sense of health awareness and health seeking attitude and behaviour amongst them. The center also offers services to geriatric patients of old age home and children of selected orphanages.

The programme thereby is involved in training of MBBS and BDS students, Interns, MSW students and Nursing students.

The programmes under this centre:

i. Teaching and Training: MBBS and BDS students are posted in the department for Family Adoption Program. Through this programme a cluster of students are allotted a family. The students will study the various aspects of health and disease influencing factors in the family. They will follow the family on a yearly basis from 1st year to internship period. This will develop a trustworthy and long lasting relationship with the families which will facilitate health seeking behaviour and promote health and prevent disease. The students will be trained in developing communication and social skills. MSW students from St Aloysius College are posted in department of RHCCDC for training on a regular basis for one semester. They are trained in field activities.

ii. Service: Community based services are offered through the various sub centers in the form of health check up, blood investigations and health education. Additional health checkup camps are conducted for the aanganwadi workers and helpers. School health checkups are regularly conducted. Additional health centre established at Chetan Nagar provides general health care on a daily basis, physiotherapy and dental health care services on a bi - weekly basis. The center runs daily from 9 am to 4 pm on six days a week. The center also offers lab diagnostic facilities. Medico social workers visit the houses in the community and offer health services, health education and family details are being recorded on a standard proforma “Family Folder”.

Health Talk and check up in special groups such as orphanage children, SHG members, Old age home residents, educational institutions centre is being organized on a periodic basis.

Blood grouping of children has been conducted in various schools. Random blood glucose testing is done in the field at the subcentres and in health camps for early screening of Diabetes Mellitus.

The centre also distributes Yen Health Cards to families in the field practice areas thus encouraging health promoting and health seeking behaviour amongst the community.

Different days of public health importance like World TB Day, World Health Day, World Environment Day, World Breast Feeding Week, Nutrition Week are observed by conducting activities in field, aanganwadi centre, TB hospital etc. Activities are conducted in collaboration with Department of Women and Child Welfare, Dakshina Kannada district. The center also observes National Pulse Polio Immunization Days in the community.

iii. Research: The center is conducting two research projects funded by Yenepoya University in the community on Diabetes Mellitus and Hypertension.

Evidence of Success

a. Health awareness talks:

Various sessions of health education are conducted on a regular basis in field practice areas and special occasions. Awareness Talk on occasion of observance of “World Tuberculosis Day” TB Sanatorium, Moodshedde, “World Breast Feeding Week”, Nutrition Day, World Health Day among others had been organized.

Special health education sessions have also been conducted for school and college students focusing on adolescent health, prevention of sexually transmitted diseases, life skills development among others.

Yen Geriatric Centre

Yen Geriatric Centre was started on 1st October 2016 with the following objectives:

Objectives: 1) To provide comprehensive care to people more than 60 years through comprehensive Geriatric Assessment.

2) To provide care to frail elderly and physically disabled elderly.

Context: with the growing Geriatric population, there is need for a dedicated geriatric clinic.

Practice: Comprehensive care was delivered through assessment of physical, psychological and social needs. It is a joint venture of department of medicine and community medicine.

Evidence of success: So far 45 new cases have been completely assessed and interventions have benefited them. Nearly 80 revisits have happened which speak for the success.

Difficulties encountered: Since it is only a once a week clinic, follow up is poor.

Resources required: Dedicated nurse and a physiotherapist to run it daily.
