

The university Consists of four constituent colleges under its ambit namely Yenepoya Medical College, Yenepoya Dental College, Yenepoya Nursing College and Yenepoya Physiotherapy College. (Nursing) with regard to examination pass criteria. The amendment as approved is hereby notified as follows:-

A candidate not securing 50% marks in aggregate in theory or practical/clinical examination in a subject shall be declared to have failed in that subject and is required to appear for both theory and practical/clinical again in the subsequent examination in that subject. |

Air pollution has also emerged as a critical risk factor leading to common non-communicable diseases (asthma, pneumonia etc). Secretary, Department of Health & Family Welfare, Ministry of Health & Family Welfare vide her letter D.O. no. 86/NCDC/CEOH&CCII/2019-20 dated 7th May, 2019 (Copy Enclosed) has drawn attention of INC for considering the revision in Nursing Education Curricula at both undergraduate & postgraduate level to ensure the inclusion of the following topics which are not adequately addressed at present in teaching and examinations:

- i. Climate Change and its impact on Health
- ii. Air Pollution and its impact on Health
- iii. Heat Wave and its impact on Health

Hence it is recommended to incorporate the above topic/areas in B.Sc (N) & Post Basic B.Sc (N) curricula under Community Health Nursing Subject. Accordingly it is requested that all college and universities may please take early action to implement the same so that these subjects are adequately covered in the curricula.

Reference is invited to INC notification 22-10/Univ./2019 dated 18.04.2019 regarding terms and conditions of admission to various Nursing Programmes. As far as the B.Sc (N) program is concerned, the minimum educational qualification is indicated as below:-

"A candidate should have passed in the subjects of Physics, Chemistry, Biology (PCB) and English individually and must have obtained a minimum of 45% marks taken together in PCB at the qualifying examination (10+2)."

References are being received seeking clarification whether the minimum marks of 45% for the PCB subjects taken together should be of the II year of the PUC exam or the average of I and II Year. It is clarified that the minimum marks of 45% in the PCB subject taken together should be taken from the qualifying examination i.e class 12th/ the II year PUC examination and not the average of I and II year.

It is requested that the above may please be kept in view while considering the eligibility of the candidates for the admission of B.Sc (N) program.

Regulations for the course

1. Title of the course

The course is titled Basic B.Sc in Nursing or B.Sc N (Basic)

2. Eligibility criteria for admission

- a. The minimum age for admission shall be 17 years on 31st December of the year in which admission is sought.
- b. A Candidate should have passed in the subjects of PCB and English individually and must have obtained a minimum of 45% marks taken together in PCB at the qualifying examination 10+2.
 - Furthermore candidate belonging to SC/ST/OBC classes, the marks obtained in PCB taken together in qualifying examination be 40% instead of 45%. English is compulsory subject in 10+2 for being eligible for admission to B.SC (N)
- c. Student should be medically fit male or female.
- d. Students appearing in 10+2 examination in Science conducted by National Institute of Open School with 45% marks shall also be considered for admission.
- e. Simultaneous attendance in multiple courses is not permitted.
- f. colour Blind candidates should may be considered for admission to nursing courses subject to the condition that colour corrective contact lens and spectacles are worn by such candidates

3. Reservation Policy:

a. For disabled candidate: 5% disability reservation to be considered with a disability of locomotor to the tune of 40% to 50% of the lower extremity and other eligibility criteria with regard to age and qualification will be same as prescribed for each nursing programme.

Note: A committee to be formed consisting of Medical officer authorized by medical board of state government and a nursing expert in the panel which may decide whether the candidates have the disability of locomotor of 40% to 50%.

- b. 5% of total marks is relaxed for SC/ST candidates.
- c. Any other reservation as per the State Govt.

Note: Reservation shall be applicable within the sanctioned number of the seats by INC and not above it.

4. Entrance / Selection test

Selection of candidates is based on marks scored in the entrance examination conducted by the University

5. Annual intake

Students are admitted once a year. The annual intake for the course is 100 as sanctioned by the Indian Nursing Council (INC).

6. Duration

Duration of the course is four years including six months of internship

7. Commencement of the course

The college academic year commences in the month of August.

8. Medium of instruction

English is the medium of instruction for all the subjects of study (except Kannada) and for examinations of the Basic B Sc Nursing degree course.

9. The syllabus

The syllabus for the course is designed based on the requirements prescribed by Indian Nursing Council. Syllabus enrichment is done based on the recommendations of the Board of studies from time to time and subject to the approval of the Academic Council of the University

10. Attendance

- a. A candidate must have a minimum 80% attendance in theory and practical, in each subject, for appearing for examinations, irrespective of the kind of absence she/he may have had.
- b. There shall be no condoner for any leave for any reason, including pregnancy, child birth, or medical conditions of any nature.
- c. For the degree to be awarded, 100% attendance in each practical / clinics is mandatory.

11. Clinical experience

In order to provide hands on skills as part of the curriculum, the students will have to undergo clinical experience in the multispecialty medical college hospital as well as in the rural health centers attached to Yenepoya University.

12. Conduct of university examinations

The university examinations will be conducted at the end of each academic year.

13. Examination for Internal Subjects

- a. The internal exams refer to the final examinations conducted by the college for which university examinations will not be conducted for subjects such as Kannada and Introduction to Computers
- b. It is compulsory to obtain pass marks in these exams
- c. The marks of Introduction to Computers only will be included in the marks sheet.

14. Internal Assessment Marks

- a. Internal Assessment Marks (IA) for theory is calculated based on the sessional examination, model examination and Continuous Comprehensive Assessment (CCA) consisting of unit tests, assignments, presentations, project work and group work etc.
- b. Internal Assessment Marks (IA) for practical is calculated based on the model practical examination and Continuous Comprehensive Assessment (CCA) consisting of clinical presentations, project work and patient care assignments.
- c. A candidate shall secure at least 50% of marks in internal assessments to be eligible to appear in the University examination.

15. Marks qualifying for pass

- a. Minimum pass marks shall be 50% in each of the theory and practical papers separately.
- b. Minimum pass marks for English shall be 40% only
- c. A candidate has to pass both theory and practical exams separately for each subject
- d. For a pass in theory, a candidate shall secure not less than 50% marks in aggregate (marks obtained in written examination and internal assessment added to together). For a pass in practical / clinical examination, a candidate shall secure not less than 50% marks in aggregate (marks obtained in University Practical/Clinical examination and internal assessment added together).

- e. A candidate not securing 50% marks in aggregate in theory or practical examination in a subject shall be declared to have failed in that subject and is required to appear for both theory and practical again in the subsequent examination in that subject.
- f. Maximum of 5 grace marks for each subject is not permitted, and grace marks should not exceed 5 marks in total marks for one academic year in theory paper only.
- g. Final year marks shall be with held till the candidate completes required attendance for practical & internship.
- Classification of results
 - 50% pass in each of the theory and practical separately
 - 50% to 59% Second division
 - 65 to 74.99% First Division
 - 75% and above distinction for declaring the rank aggregate of 4 years marks to be considered

16. Practical examination

- a. All practical examinations are held in the respective clinical areas.
- b. The maximum number of candidates for practical examination may not exceed 20 per day.
- c. One internal and one external examiner appointed by the university will jointly conduct the practical examinations and viva-voce for each student.

17. Examiners

- a. An examiner should be a lecturer or above from a College of Nursing with M.Sc. (N) in the concerned subject, with minimum three years of teaching experience in the collegiate programme.
- b. To be an examiner for nursing foundation, a faculty having M.Sc. (N) with any specialty shall be considered.
- c. Nursing faculty will be the examiners for nursing subjects as well as the non-nursing subjects such as Anatomy and Physiology, Psychology, Biochemistry, Microbiology and Nutrition. However, non-nursing faculty with M.Sc. in respective subjects can be arranged as guest lecturers/external faculty/part time teaching faculty for teaching.

18. Carryover of failed subjects

If a candidate fails in more than one/two subjects in any nursing programme they can be promoted to the next year. (As per INC resolution: F.No.1-5/2014-INC dated 29.10.2014) The candidate shall have to clear all the previous examination before appearing for final year examination.

The maximum period to complete the course successfully should not exceed 8 years.

19. Revaluation / re-totaling / photocopies of answer papers

Revaluation of answer papers is not permitted. Only re-totaling of theory answer papers is allowed in the failed subjects. Application for the same should be through the institution, within 10 days from the date of announcement. Photocopies of theory answer sheet of university examinations will be available by paying the prescribed fees.

20. Vacation

The students will be declared the vacation 3 times in an academic year.

21. Internship (Integrated Practice)

a. Students will be under internship for a period of six months during fourth year of the course.

- b. Internship refers to 8 hours of integrated clinical duties in which two weeks of evening and night shift duties are included.
- c. Internship should be carried out as eight hours per day at 48 hours per week.
- d. Students in internship will be supervised by nursing teachers.
- e. Fourth year final examination would be held only after completing internship.
- f. On completion of internship, internal assessment of 100 marks should be sent to the university for inclusion in the mark sheet.

22. Student Nurses Association

Students joining the nursing course will automatically entitled to be the member of Student Nurses Association (SNA). The prescribed fee for membership is to be paid as per the notification of Trained Nurses Associations of India (TNAI). After completion of the course, students will be eligible to transfer the membership to Trained Nurses Associations of India after obtaining State Nursing Council Registration.

23. Dress code

The students of the course have to follow the dress code prescribed by the institution for regular classes as well as during the clinical posting.

24. Health services

- a. On admission, students will undergo a routine medical examination, and thereafter, annually.
- b. Free medical care during illness and/provision of health insurance is available.
- c. A complete health record is kept in respect of each individual student. The question of continuing the training of a student with long term chronic illness will be decided by the college.
- d. Vaccination against hepatitis B and other communicable disease is provided, as deemed necessary.

25. Curbing The menace of ragging in the campus

- a. Ragging has been declared as a *criminal offence* (Supreme Court of India) hence, any act of such kind is punishable as per the law.
- b. On admission every student and his/her parents to file an **affidavit** avowing not to indulge in ragging.

26. Hostel facilities

Separate hostels are provided for men and women within the campus. All the rooms are well furnished and well equipped. The students are expected to stay in the hostels throughout the period of their study. The hostels have facilities to cater to both vegetarian & non-vegetarian students. The hostels are provided with basic amenities, mess, TV room, recreation room, basketball & volleyball courts and visitors area. Each hostel is managed by a Chief Warden and two Assistant Wardens.

27. Library

Central Library contains a collection of updated new editions of books, journals and periodicals. For the benefit of students the central library remains open from 9 am to 12 midnight.

28. Student Mentorship programme (SMP)

The institution has student mentorship programme. This programme is meant to help the students to cope with the professional college life as well as the personal life. A mentor will cater to maximum of twenty (20) students. A mentor will be the faculty of the respective college takes special care of students in the form of counseling and personal contact with parents.
