2.14. Significant Activities and contributions made by IQAC

The IQAC played an active role in internalising a culture of quality within the institution. The quality was maintained and sustained by the following initiatives taken by the cell.

- The Monthly data collection format was revised as per the revised guidelines by NAAC
- The Expert Committee constituted by University Grants Commission, New Delhi had visited Yenepoya (Deemed to be University) during 8th to 10th December 2017 to review its functioning and while submitting its report vide letter F.No.26-2/2008(CPP-1/DU) dated 20th February 2018 had made the following suggestions to bring about qualitative improvement in the programmes offered by our University. They are detailed as below:-
 1. Foundation programmes on admission should be introduced for all the courses (MBBS, BDS, B.Sc.(Nursing) and BPT to make the students comfortable.
 2. Efforts should be made to provide Super speciality services in various Medical and surgical disciplines.
 3. The clinical material needs to be further augmented.
 4. Although University has made reasonable strides in research activities, however, further impetus should be made specially in clinical areas.
 5. The faculty be further motivated for innovative, collaborative and start up oriented research.
 6. The biomedical waste management at individual clinical level should be further strengthened.
 7. Language classes may be introduced so that the students can improve communication with the patients.
 8. The University should encourage student exchanges with other institutions in India and abroad.

Efforts were made and necessary actions have been taken for complying the above suggestions within the stipulated time and compliance report was submitted to UGC on 24th September 2018.

- Conducted regular quarterly meetings with specific agenda and reviewed the work done by all constituent colleges and several workshops have been conducted on quality assessment.
- The teaching hospital has undergone accreditation process of NABH
- The central laboratory and teaching hospital has been accredited by NABL
- Emphasised various stake holders about the prime need of quality.
- Carried out feedback Analysis and Recommendations from stake holders.
- Endeavored to streamline and strengthen efforts towards effective documentation and easy retrieval of data.
- All the necessary documentation of data and information was done meticulously through a system of monthly/evaluative reports collected from all departments, colleges, centres, cells and statutory bodies.
- The AQAR for 2015-16 and 2016-17 was compiled and uploaded.
- Coordinated visits and orientation sessions of visiting faculty teams from several institutions.

- Enabling better participation from differently abled in institutional activities.
- University has won the Best Film award for the film “THE UNSIGHTED” in the ‘National University Film Making Competition’ launched by University Grants Commission (UGC) in 2018 for the Anti ragging measures.

- Double valuation for UG examinations. If there is 15% difference in the marks between I and II valuation the system will suggest for III valuation and it is done accordingly. Four valuations for PG Examinations.
- Online multiple choice questions for PhD Entrance examinations.
- Uniform valuation: each staff corrects same question in all papers of the particular test. Summative assessment: As per the Yenepoya University examination guidelines.
- For the first time, this year “On Screen Marking System” has been introduced on pilot scale.
- **Photocopy:** The facility of obtaining Photocopy of assessed answer booklets by the examinee is extended with a view to bring transparency in the examinations system and ensure its credibility. This facility is provided for theory papers only of all the examinations conducted by the University.
- **Digital evaluation:** Makes evaluation faster and error free. It is a transparent process that comes with a high degree of security. It prevents over sighting of the answers by the evaluators or calculation errors. Safeguards allegations on the exam section and thus prevents reputational damage for the institution.

2.12. How does IQAC Contribute/Monitor/Evaluate the Teaching & Learning processes:

Data collection format for teaching learning process has been developed and is circulated to all the departments. The filled in data is collected and analyzed on monthly basis. Suitable interventions are suggested in consultation with the Deans, members of Board of Studies and Centre for Health Professional Education. The relevant suggestions are incorporated and placed in respective Board of Studies and Academic Council and are implemented. All faculty members participating teaching-learning training programmes, conducted by Medical Education Unit and Centre for Health Professional Education on regular basis, till date 06 workshop have been conducted in this year.

- Regular monthly meetings and interaction with faculty.
- Internal audit by IQAC members and Academic review committee.
- Feedback results are used to assist in faculty development programme based on the needs of individual faculty
- IQAC coordinates with the library and IT department for data usage and assessment.
- Teaching learning process is monitored by checking the problem solving ability of the student when they are given an assignment or project.
- It is also evaluated based on the difficulty level of the question paper
- Attainment level in each periodical test.
- Collect and review monthly evaluation reports from all departments and develop learning strategies wherever necessary.
- Outcome Based Education is done for all the courses semester wise to monitor the performance of the students on regular basis
- Remedial Courses for slow learners.
- Parental counseling.
- Frequent meetings are conducted with IT department to ensure e-learning modules are updated and practiced across all the colleges of the University.
- This year, the IQAC has proposed a new initiative namely Academic Corrections and Advisory Committee which advises the slow learners and helps in improving their performance.
- To enhance skills, this year several innovative teaching modules based on simulation were developed. Currently, these modules are undergoing validation and expert review. This will be introduced in the curriculum by 2018-19.
- Additional classes, special tutorials, weekly assignments and revision test
- Additional learners are provided additional learning material including e resources and encouraged to participate in quiz and other inter college events.
- Pursue research and undertake group project work
- Problem Based Learning (PBL) and Case Based Learning (CBL) in used in some departments
- Student performance mapping using OBE software has been introduced.

3.26. Major Activities during the year in the sphere of extension activities and Institutional Social Responsibility

University has structured its extension activity following some of the key initiatives which have been largely successful in health delivery to the rural masses and also recognised by the Government agencies and are awarded.

Centre for Rural Health Care and Development with 29 sub centres under this program has implemented Door to Door health delivery, Yen Health Care on wheels, Training of Family Doctor System, Yen Health Cards, Health awareness talks, School and College Health check up camps, blood grouping and blood sugar check-up camps, major camps, immunization programs, additional peripheral centres, Dhantha Bhagya Yojane in collaboration with Government of Karnataka, free Dentures were provided to patients with BPL card. Nutrition centre and development of mobile app N-TB for the nutritional care and support for patients with tuberculosis, Geriatric clinic, Geriatric Psycho care centre, Smile train program, Samraksha, Kara Seva, Unnath Bharat Abhiyan, Health education program, Swachh Bharat Program, Environmental awareness program, Observation of Health days, Cancer awareness outreach program. The following Departments are actively involved in reaching out to the community through various routine initiative programs:

- i) Department of Community Medicine
- ii) Department of Public Health
- iii) Department of Public Health Dentistry
- iv) Medical Social Work Department
- v) Department of Community Nursing
- vi) National Service Scheme Unit
- vii) Cancer awareness outreach program Committee

The University has undertaken a unique initiative namely Cancer Awareness outreach program through various sources like NSS and Nursing students to train about 13,500 NSS volunteers through which the University can reach out educating about 13.5 lakh people. The details of the program are [Enclosed as Annexure 5](#)

In addition to the above activities University has contributed significantly for the development of network neighborhood and has maintained very strong relationship with the public through various development programmes. ([Details enclosed in Annexure 6](#))

Centre for Nutrition Studies: The Centre for Nutrition Studies at Yenepoya (Deemed to be University) has been carrying out extension activity in terms of policy and advocacy for the Government and Non Government sector. Some of the key outcome of such policy initiatives are as follows:-

The Centre has developed N-TB app in collaboration with Mc Gill University, RNTCP, WHO (India) which has now been displayed in every RNTCP centre in the country. This was the outcome of a guidance document namely Nutritional Care and Support of Patients with Tuberculosis in India which was submitted to Government of India by the Central TB division, DGHS. The field charts prepared by the Centre for Nutritional screening and assessment have been adopted in Pradhan Mantri Surakshit Matrutva Abhiyan. This Centre has also organised several National and International meetings/workshops in collaboration with People's Health Movement (PHM-Global), Jan Swasthya Abhiya (PHM-India), Public Health Resource Network (PHRN) and International Food Policy Research Institute(IFRI).

The faculty in this Centre have been invited to National and International organizations to deliver lectures in NGOs in the last one year. Currently there are more than four research projects undertaken from various National and International agencies.

Under Unnat Bharat Abhiyan:

The Ministry of Human Resource Development had launched a programme “Unnat Bharat Abhiyan” with an aim to connect the higher educational institutions to the villages around for transfer of knowledge to enrich rural India. Yenepoya (Deemed to be University) under this scheme has adopted 5 villages (Kumpala, Harekala, Pavor, Chembugudde, Sajipa Nadu) covering around 24,352 population to work in line with the objectives of the program.

The following problems were identified:-

- Lack of knowledge about government programmes and policies
- Absence of a proper household waste collection system.
- Poor awareness regarding the central government scheme
- Poor road accessibility since most of the houses were located in difficult terrains.
- Mosquito breeding sites
- Improper sewage and soil waste disposal.
- Poor awareness among the residents of the village about government scheme.
- Contaminated Drinking Water.
- Suffering from Respiratory problems due to beedi rolling.
- Poor awareness among the residents of the village about government scheme.

The Centre for Rural Health Care and Development has carried out sensitization programs, organized awareness programs, and helped in empowering these villagers towards self

sufficiency and sustainable village development and implement the government programmes successfully.

Cancer Awareness : Yenepoya (Deemed to be University) has launched an unique program namely Cancer awareness and outreach program (CAOP) to reach out millions in rural India as part of social responsibility of the University.

The main objective was to create awareness about prevention, risk factors, importance of early diagnosis of cancer among the public and empower people recognize the symptoms and seek early treatment. Several programs were conducted for Anganwadi workers and Accredited Social Health Activist (ASHAs) to train them to create awareness among the target population about prevention, risk factors, screening, treatment options and social security schemes for cancers. Training modules were developed for Oral, Breast and Cervical cancers after extensive discussions, brain storming sessions involving experts and representatives and these modules were prepared in five languages and the same were delivered in Udupi and Mangalore Districts covering 1657 Anganwadi workers and Accredited Social Health Activists of the population of 1,36,424 adult population under 89 sub-centres of Udupi District. More than 50 group discussions were conducted for these workers through the District administration and this is one of the largest kind of exercise involving Anganwadi and ASHAs workers in the District. The effectiveness of such project “Impact of cancer awareness outreach program in Udupi District of Karnataka State” was evaluated by a funded agency Tata Trusts. The major outcome after completion of this project is that there has been improvement in the knowledge about the adult population among all the three taluks of Udupi and the people are willing to undergo screening for cancer on regular basis. It was also recommended to have more such periodic training programs for organised population based cancer screening program, screening for other non communicable diseases, community mobilisation, Public Private People partnership, establish Mobile health care units and continuity of care should be implemented to effectively manage rising burden of cancer. The details of the activities conducted are furnished in Appendix-1(M).

This centre also publishes quarterly newsletter. This center also has collaborations with other Centres for Health Professional Education in the country for exchange of information, literature and advanced training.

The objectives of the program are:-

1. To familiarise newly joined students to their environment and curriculum, appraise students regarding their campus life, rules and regulations of the Institution.
2. Available support system: In terms of available support personal support, utilisation of facilities in the campus, including Sports, E-learning, Library, etc., importance of their training and its impact on the society through connected engagements such as NSS, Kara Seva, Samraksha, sensitization of communication skills, ethics, empathy and learning abilities, lay foundation for developing a healthy attitude, sportsmanship spirit and also utilisation of teaching facilities and introduction of Teaching staff of the University.
3. To actively involve socializing and physical activity, Creative Arts and Culture, Literary activity, Lectures by eminent people, visits to local areas.
4. To prepare students to handle peer pressure and professional pressure

The Context: Currently very less focus has been laid on orienting students through foundation course and most of the times the students take much time for adjusting to the newer environment and culture of the Institution. Hence these programs will help them in integrating themselves to the prevailing environment within the institution and enjoy their stay and enrich learning experience in the campus which has to be stress free and participate.

Evidence of Success: Feedback collected after this program has been highly encouraging and students have communicated that due to this they were able to quickly adapt to the environment and enjoy their stay with the facilities available to them in the campus. This has also provided a platform to understand the students with the people from various religion, culture and background. Most of the students felt that they were better prepared to study and handle their professional responsibility effectively. This has created a positive environment and has been successful in imparting value education and holistic development of the students.

The Mentor-Mentee program will take care of the students concerned and help them subsequently during their course completion period. The feedback has been received to continue this Mentor-Mentee program and offer it to 3rd and 4th year Undergraduates and extend to the Post Graduate students too. A dedicated student counselling system is also notified in order to reduce anxiety, student stress, fear of failure, home sickness and other worries of the students. The Student welfare Officers, mentors, wardens are also oriented and sensitized towards student behaviour and to support student activities.

Problems encountered: The major problem encountered is availability of resource persons to handle the topics to be covered under orientation program. The second challenge is to overcome the time schedule which is outlined in the academic calendar as this foundation course extends to almost three weeks. The major resources required here are co-ordinating the student requirement and financial commitment towards their lunch and transportation. It is also challenging to convince the parents and students regarding the requirement of such a foundation course and their active participation in such programs for three weeks. 7.3. Give two Best Practices of the institution

1. YEN MITHRA

Objective of the practice: Yen Mithra is a program designed to implement effective health care delivery to the remote and un-accessed areas. The participants of this initiative are interested volunteers (Teachers, Panchayat members, Health guides, Self Help group leaders of the particular locality) spread over several hundred Kilo meters from the main hospital. These volunteers disseminate information about the health care facilities and benefits to the respective regions. They create awareness through hand bills, posters and banners. Currently we have 200 Yen Mithras in 12 districts spread across Kerala and Karnataka.

The Context: The major challenge of any hospital is regarding patient availability and this is very important in terms of training students to give effective health care delivery to the rural masses. Yenepoya (Deemed to be University) is located in a rural setting and there are three other medical colleges in the vicinity. Hence it was a challenging task for the Institution to come up with an idea of the practice which can increase the patient number attending the hospital as well as extending its health care services to the rural and beyond rural areas.

This challenge was effectively addressed through several new and innovative initiatives i.e. Family Adoption programs, Health care and wellness program, Senior citizens health care, camps and also entering into MOUs with Non Government organisations and offering services through Yen Arogya Card, Patient guidance centres, Health education programs, Vidyarathi cards, Door to door delivery programs as part of institutional commitment. The treatment provided under most of these schemes is completely free including bed and food with almost zero financial burden to patients.

The Practice: The practice is to identify Yen Mithras in their own areas spread over 12 Districts in Kerala and Karnataka covering almost 3 to 5 lakh population. These Mithras refer the patients who need hospital care through their communication channels to the Doctors directly as well as the co-ordinating authorities in the Hospital who also guide the patients regarding the facilities available, Doctor expertise and arrange for their travel plans. The outcome of this practice is becoming phenomenal and currently on any given day more than 1000 people are referred to the outpatient department of the hospital. This step has been extremely useful for the hospital as well as for the students who are exposed to adverse case studies and get hands on expertise which is an essential component in health care institution. The patients are also happy in terms of shorter stay, free food, free bedding as well as extreme care in terms of standard as hospital is accredited with NABH and NABL. Hence this has proved to be a successful model in terms of extending health care to outreach areas.

Evidence of success: In the last one year 6,381 patients have been referred by Yen Mithras. Most of the patients referred are from low economic background and are referred from North Karnataka i.e Davanagere, Bellary, Haveri, Chithradurga, Shivamogga and Malnad districts like Hassana, Coorg.

The results indicate that such kind of initiatives which involves different methodologies of reaching to the patient would help in improving the public health targets and motivating people to avail best possible treatment in order to reduce the disease burden. All these efforts are complimented through various programs listed above.

Problems encountered and resources required: The major problems encountered are to coordinate and constantly keeping in touch with these Yen Mithras. Hence dedicated communication channels have been opened on regular basis and also the Yen Mithras are invited once in a year to the main hospital where they are provided with training regarding the communication, follow up and completion of the task. Good amount of funding has to be provided for communication and incentives for the large number of cases referred to the hospital. The results are also essential in terms of providing free travel, free bed and free food, free drugs which results in huge amount of financial burden on the hospital. Every year huge amount is spent for extending such facilities. The details of the Yen Mithra practice as well as extension activity carried out to support such initiative and number of people benefited due to such practice are [enclosed in Annexure 8](#)

2. Enhancing Skill training and developing competency of health professionals using Simulation based teaching/ Simulation Center.

The Yenepoya Deemed to be University the emphasis is on improving the overall health status of the society. To improve the health care of the society, we used two fold approach; first by creating competent health care professionals and secondly, providing opportunities for regularly updating the skills and competency of existing doctors. We applied the concept of Simulation based training in imparting and enhancing skills. Simulation has the potential to revolutionize health care and address the patient safety issues if appropriately utilized and integrated into the educational and organizational improvement process.

The patient safety and medical errors have been the focus of attention worldwide. Simulation is defined as a method used in health care education to mimic real patient experiences with scenarios designed to replicate real health encounters, using lifelike mannequins, physical models, standardized patients, or computers. The trainee gets an opportunity to practically apply his knowledge and skills. This experiential learning happens in a stress free student friendly environment. Integrating simulation, in graduate and post graduate curriculum, was also aimed at facilitating more ethical training with least harm and discomfort to patient. In order to plan and implement a Simulation based teaching we faced several challenges such as creating a curriculum with competency based outcomes, training the team of instructors, planning the logistics and establishing a simulation center.

The simulators, task trainers and SCEs facilitate reproducible and on-demand access to clinical experiences. It provides opportunity for training to be conducted for inter-professional team of health providers rather than in isolation. The educational, research and scholarship potential of simulation centre is also immense.

Simulation based learning helps to mitigate errors and maintain safety in medical field where there is zero tolerance for any deviation from the Standard protocols. Multi disciplinary & team training for emergency situations can assist in better team dynamics and more realistic training.

With the goal of improving the health status of society, the simulation based training was integrated in curriculum of various subjects. The training was extended to undergraduate, interns and post graduates students of courses being offered by the University. The in job doctors were also provided opportunity to hone their skills. Workshops were conducted for the purpose of focused and hands on training. Most of these training sessions included multi disciplinary participants from various departments. This ensured that inter professional communication and team building was also done.

Several constraints were faced during these training programs such as scheduling, lack of protected time for trainer faculty. These were overcome to an extent by scheduling the classes in the time table of students. Each department a faculty was identified and was given the responsibility of creating training programs for their subjects. Trainers from ACTS YEN and medical education unit ensured regular faculty development program to support the faculty, taking these sessions. They were trained in variety of topics like preparation of scenario, debriefing techniques, operating the software to assessment in simulation. Several trainers were also deputed to external centers for training.

The concept of skill and competency training was extended to society also. ACTS YEN actively participates in training of non medical personal like the general public, teachers, school students, auto rickshaw drivers. Yen Samaritan cards were issued to members of general public who undergo training as first responders.

The center also received American Heart Association Accreditation as training centre for BLS, ACLS and ECG courses.

To streamline the entire process, each department from all constituent college, nominated a faculty member as coordinators to plan and implement the simulation based programs.

All the hands on training sessions were done in a modular approach. This included feedback and pre and post test. Majority of the programmes showed post training improvement in the post test scores.

One such training implemented at ACTS-YEN was ‘code blue ‘ training for consultants, nurses to manage cardiac emergencies in the hospital and it was observed that considerable level of competency improved in the health care team members in identifying and managing cardiac arrest cases. It was one of the assessment criteria for hospital for NABH accreditation. Another area of training which improved the clinical outcome was on Triaging system in the emergency department and disaster management preparedness. Both of these areas were trained in simulation lab and multiple simulation based trainings were conducted at emergency department.

American Heart association courses (BLS, ACLS) has competency assessment after the training by the standards set by AHA and most of our candidates are clearing the test in first attempt.

Envisioning the vast potential of simulation led to the establishment of Advanced Comprehensive Clinical Training and Simulation Center (ACTS YEN). To fulfill the varied requirements of spectrum of health professionals ranging from medical, dental, nursing, pharmacy and paramedical, numerous task trainers and mannikins were acquired. This required a huge monetary investment. This hi tech set up is associated with a recurring cost of maintenance.

Since simulation based training is an innovative method of teaching and learning, hence faculty needed training. The core faculty was trained by international and national experts. Further multiple training sessions ensured that the faculty is well trained to take on the challenge of designing and implementing simulation based training and courses.

The team required for simulation based training requires not only health professional, but also includes secretarial support, IT team, engineer (specializing in biomedical or simulators), Public relation Officer etc. Recruitment and retention of these faculties has been a constant problem, as the work here is quite specialized and experienced staff is not so easy to acquire. This is being overcome to an extent by incentivizing the concerned faculty.

7.4. Contribution to environmental awareness/protection

Programs organised for building up awareness among students and faculty. Following days were observed:

Centre for Environmental Studies celebrated Vanamahotsava on 07 July 2017 by distributing fruit saplings of Pomegranate, jackfruit, guava, Jamun fruit, Graviola fruit, Mango, Chikoo, Pineapple, Gooseberry etc. to students and staff of the University. A total of 130 fruit saplings are distributed on that occasion.

Annexure – V

Extension Activities and Institutional Social Responsibility (ISR)

Extension of curriculum from institutional level to community:

As per the regulations laid down by various national regulatory bodies, extension is a part of curriculum to the community and is an essential requirement. At Yenepoya (Deemed to be University) sensitization on Institutional social responsibility is imparted through class room teaching as well as providing direct exposure to the community. Accordingly for MBBS, community medicine is one of the subjects. Similarly, Community Dentistry, Public Health and Community Health Nursing departments also offer similar components in the curriculum. The constituent colleges of Yenepoya (Deemed to be University) have made elaborate arrangements by way of infrastructure, faculty, support staff, learning resources etc. to enable these departments to carry out curricular activities to sensitize the students to community environment. During exposure to the community both students and the faculty members are involved in health care delivery, health education, health checkup camps and house to house visits. This activity not only gives them the rationale for institutional social responsibility but also reinforcement of social welfare values and concepts.

Details of social outreach programmes undertaken by the University:

Centre for Rural Health Care and Development: Yenepoya (Deemed to be University) basically is an inclusive institution and has on its role moderately higher number of students from minority and other backward class and is located in a Panchayath/Rural area. It has the commitment to take medical education and health care delivery to the less privileged classes of the community. To satisfy this objective, University has started a dedicated Centre for Rural Health care and Development in addition to routine community departments of the constituent colleges. The centre is playing a pivotal role in sensitizing its faculty and students to the social responsibilities envisaged through certain unique programmes as detailed below.

- **Training on Family Doctor System:**

In the context of globalization where health care delivery is highly complex and expensive (Yenepoya Deemed to be University) considered introduction of family doctor system as a most effective method through which the country can ensure all the families are covered under the health care delivery system. Accordingly the University took a strategic decision to train its students on family doctor system. The Centre for Rural Health Care Development in collaboration with Community Medicine and Public Health Dentistry has designed a programme where clusters of families in the outreach areas are assigned to group of students who will look after the health care requirements of these families thereby creating a mindset conducive to become family doctors of tomorrow.

- **Yen Health Cards:**

The patients referred by the personnel engaged in the family doctor systems and the patients referred through the aforesaid projects for advanced investigations and treatments are all provided with the Yen Health and Arogya cards which will enable them to avail these facilities either free or at heavily subscribed rates (**Appendix 1 (A)**)

- **Yen Health Care on Wheels:**

In spite of establishing 38 sub centers, we could identify some outreach areas where centers could not be established. For these areas the University conceived the idea of health care on wheels and titled it as ‘Yen Health Care on wheels’. Ambulances and dedicated vehicles are specifically designed, furnished and equipped to function as mobile medical and dental outpatient departments where groups of medical/dental personals constituting of doctors, students, nurses and paramedics are posted on these mobile clinics, to visit these outreach areas and conduct clinics regularly. For the year 2017-18; details are enclosed as **Appendix 1(B)**.

- **Door to Door Health Care delivery Programme:**

University has established 29 Sub centers and 09 Dental rural centers in the rural and outreach areas in and around the campus (**Appendix-1 (C)**). The 29 sub centers cover the entire population of the 10 Panchayats and these centers concentrate on primary health care for those who require investigations and treatment beyond the primary care are referred to YMCH. While implementing this programme, it was noticed that many of the villagers were illiterate and under-privileged and did not understand the necessity of utilizing the services available for their health needs. They approach these centers only when they fall ill. To tide over this problem, the RHCD came out with a programme of Door to Door health care delivery where doctors, medical students and para-medicals from different groups make house to house visits, identify the public health problems faced by them and help them to solve these problems. This programme of health care delivery has been widely appreciated. For the year 2017-18; details are enclosed as **Appendix 1 (D)**.

- **Routine activities:**

The routine activities conducted include Health screening camps, detection Camps, Immunization Camps, Treatment Camps, Blood donation camps etc. In last two years several such programmes have been organized by the departments of Community Medicine, The Centre for Rural Health Care and Development and Department of Medical Social Work.

- **Health Awareness Talks:**

Health awareness programmes are conducted at community level regarding various communicable diseases and methods of prevention regarding water and food borne disease like gastroenteritis, infective hepatitis, mosquito borne diseases like Dengue, Chickengunia, Malaria, Filaria etc. Emphasis is given with regard to the relationship between personal hygiene, environmental hygiene etc, with the maintenance of health.

School health education programme to ensure that school children, parents and teachers are aware of good practice in maintaining the physical and mental health of children in a proper way.

The aforesaid activities have created remarkable impact on the social output of students and they themselves take the initiatives to constitute and organize their own program called ‘Samraksha’.

Samraksha: mobilizes funds through various activities (e.g., Art for Charity) and helping hand is extended to the suffering patients from the less privileged sections of the society.

Role of the university in promotion of neighborhood network and student engagement:

The University has also entered into MoU’s with non- governmental organizations to provide services for specifically mentally and physically disadvantaged groups like mentally retarded children, psychiatric patients, physically challenged, orphans and destitute.

All the above said activities apart from ensuring health care delivery sensitizes the faculty and students to unique health problems faced by the village communities in the neighborhood and contributes to the holistic development of the students and thereby creating a new generation with a right attitude towards the rest privileged in the neighborhood.

University through its various organs described has already pledged its commitments towards implementation of all the national health programmes and contribute to reach at the Millennium Development goals related to health care delivery.

The Department of Medical Social Work in collaboration with the Department of Ophthalmology plays a major role in the implementation of National Programme on eradication of blindness in association with non-governmental service organization like Lions club international, Rotary club etc.

Regular monthly camps organized by the Medical Social Work Department are used to train the interns in the curative health services to the poorer and disadvantaged section of the society. Regular camps on blindness detection, diabetes, cancer detection etc. are conducted by the University for building a healthy society by giving easy access to the modern healthcare.

Dental trauma awareness programme

These programs are conducted in schools around Mangalore where a large number of locals along with students have benefitted (Auto rickshaw driver, bus drivers, social workers, physical trainers, play home staff etc.). Blood check up camps for detection of Anemia, Diabetes, Malaria and Filaria with facilities for routine blood investigation and blood grouping; School health check up programme for early detection of diseases and timely treatment and prevention of diseases through well planned immunization programme are contributing to build and strengthen interface between the University and the neighborhood community.

Students and faculty in extension activities:

NSS was established by the University in 2010 and at present has 1 NSS Coordinator 10 NSS Officers organizes various activities in 06 constituent colleges. Every unit organizes its activities under the established norms of NSS namely, regular activities and special camps. Under the regular activities in collaboration with the Centre for Rural Health Care and Development, NSS has organized several medical camps and awareness programmes and adopted villages for comprehensive health care delivery. As part of these activities NSS has focused on the less privileged sections of the society like physically challenged, mentally retarded and those with visual and hearing impairments etc. Mechanical Aids and wheel chairs were procured and distributed to these unfortunate ones. Special camps were also arranged to sensitize the students to mental and physical problems faced by the people living in tribal areas high range. Camps for National Integration are conducted in campus and in selected localities around the campus. NSS volunteers are actively involved in the activities of the **Centre for Environmental Studies** in the green auditing of Flora and Fauna of the University Campus and help in keeping the green campus and clean doing full justice to the concept of **SwachhBharath**. As part of this exercise, NSS had erected sign boards displaying the relevance of prevention of substance and maintenance of personal and environmental cleanliness in and around the society.

University has created dedicated **Centre for the Prevention of Substance Abuse** apart from declaring the campus substance free. NSS and Youth Red Cross organized several programs on the deleterious effects of alcohol, tobacco, ganja and drugs. The Centre also conducts awareness programmes in the neighboring educational institutions and voluntary organizations for students, teachers and members.

Under **Youth Red Cross**, University has a red ribbon club that has created a list of student blood donors with their blood groups. The red ribbon club provides donors at the time of necessity in a systematic way.

Smile Train Programme:

University in collaboration with Smile Train, USA and Germany has established a dedicated **Centre for the Craniofacial Anomalies**. These anomalies which include cleft lip and palate and spectrum of complex craniofacial anomalies have always been a treatment challenge where various specialists namely, Oral and Maxillofacial Surgeons, Plastic Surgeons, Neurosurgeons, ENT Surgeons, Ophthalmologists, were to be coordinated depending on the nature of Anomaly. This could be solved to a great extent through the emergence of a dedicated specialty namely craniofacial surgery. YU has been fortunate enough to have well qualified and competent team of specialists in these complex interdisciplinary areas for thousands of unfortunate patients at a totally free of cost with the help of Smile Train. The details of the Centre are furnished in **Appendix- 1 (E)**.

The Centre has already come out with a post- doctoral programme in this interdisciplinary area for surgeons from different specialties like oral and maxillofacial surgery, plastic surgery, ENT etc. to specialize in the surgery of acquired and congenital craniofacial anomalies. ICMR has recognized this centre as one of the National Centres for treating Craniofacial Anomalies.

Institution also actively participates in the programmes of national importance namely pulse polio programme, breast feeding programme, vector borne disease control programme, HIV/AIDS programme, blindness control programme, nutrition programmes etc.

Institution also observes all the important days and weeks outlined by WHO, Union of India, Govt. of Karnataka and University Grants Commission. All Institutions have extensively collaborated with various government departments for specific purposes which include:

- YMCH and Hospital collaborate with the District Health and Family Welfare Department in organizing health care education and also in epidemic control in the designated taluks of D.K. District depending on need.
- YMCH extends services to the public through ICTC (Integrated Counseling & Testing Centre) for voluntary blood testing for detection of HIV which is established by Karnataka State Aids Prevention Society.
- DOTS Centre under RNTCP of Government of India is also function at YMCH which provides free testing and dispensing of drugs for treatment of Tuberculosis.
- With a vision to make cataract free zone YMCH with financial grant from District Blindness Control Society is undertaking cataract screening and surgery camps in the 12 PHCs in Mangalore and Bantwal Taluks allotted by the DBCS of Dakshina Kannada.
- To further women and child health YMCH has joined hands with Nirmala Charitable Hospital Ullal by posting specialists and PGs in OBG and Paediatrics disciplines on regular basis.
- YMCH collaborates with the District Child Welfare Committee of Dakshina Kannada (CWC) in conducting health checkup programme at fixed intervals in the six Orphanages affiliated CWC in Mangalore Taluk.
- YMCH collaborate with the District Health and Family Welfare Department in organizing monthly health check-up clinics in Community Health Centre Moodbidri for the families affected from Endosulphan spray.
- YMC collaborates with the District Health and Family Welfare Department of Dakshina Kannada for conducting MBBS rural posting in Kotekar and Kurnad PHCs.
- YMCH collaborate with the District Health and Family Welfare Department in compulsory immunization, pulse polio, family planning and control of communicable diseases.

Medical Social Work department in the hospital is actively involved in extension activities like conducting awareness programmes, medical camps, screening camps, immunization camps, treatment camps, blood donation camps etc. Details of the activities carried out by the Dept. MSW are enclosed as **Appendix 1 (F)**.

The outreach programmes namely Door to Door Health Care Delivery, Health Care on Wheels, Training on Family doctor System, Yen Health Card Programmes etc. implemented through the Centre for Rural Health Care and Development are also contributing to social justice and empowerment of the underprivileged.

RHCD Centre has taken up several projects that include two survey based research projects. Details of unique and the routine projects taken up by the centre are enclosed as **Appendix 1 (G)**. There are currently two ongoing research projects on emerging challenges on non-communicable disease such as diabetes and hypertension.

Community Medicine Dept. also conducts awareness programs, screening camps, immunization camps, treatment camps etc. apart from rehabilitation initiatives and research activities mentioned above. For these activities in the rural areas the department has dedicated rural centres and an urban health centre specifically for the sake of the less privileged poor in the society. Details of the camps/activities carried out by the Department of Community Medicine are enclosed as **Appendix 1 (H)**.

Public Health Dentistry also has 9 peripheral centres to coordinate their extension activities in the rural and outreach areas. This centre also demonstrates its responsibility of bringing up the new generation with appropriate oral health through camps conducted in the nursery and primary level schools. The Department of Pedodontics also joins with Department of Public Health Dentistry in carrying out these activities directed towards maintaining the oral health among school going children. Departments of Public Health Dentistry and Paedodontics have conducted school screening camps and other oral health care programmes. Details of such programmes are enclosed as **Appendix 1 (I)**.

Community Health Nursing: Community and family based Nursing Care is a new area being introduced in the nursing. Accordingly, they also join the University's endeavor to take health care profession and health care delivery to the community at a family level. 43 awareness camps, rehabilitation camps, road shows, runs etc. were conducted during the last two year. Details are furnished in **Appendix 1 (J)**.

Details of social surveys, research or extension work undertaken by the institution to ensure social justice and empower the underprivileged and the most vulnerable sections of society:

Most of the departments under the university conduct survey (social) based research as part of community engagement and extension of medical education from the hospital environment to the community environment.

Community Medicine Department has initiated above twenty research projects related to epidemiological aspects of various diseases. Various departments in the Nursing College have taken up Survey based research projects as shown below.

Mechanism for tracking the students' involvement in various social movements/ activities that promotes citizenship roles:

Student involvement in various community and educational based service activities is closely monitored by the faculty. University has a system of conveying departmental meetings where the curriculum is critically reviewed and the student participation in community based activities is discussed in detail. Participation in activities that promote citizenship roles among students is part of the curriculum and attendance is mandatory. To monitor the student involvement in community based activities organized by the Centre for Rural Health care and Development, MSW Dept., NSS and Youth Red Cross a very effective mentorship programme is in place where the students are divided into small groups and it is the responsibility of the mentor faculty to ensure adequate participation of the students in all social movements and activities that promote citizenship roles. In general we found an overwhelming participation of students in implementing a spectrum of projects being implemented either as part of curriculum or as a part of beyond the curriculum projects.

To enable the students to play citizenship roles, the University observes several national and international days like World environmental day, No tobacco day, World health days etc. In connection with these days, street plays, skit, walkathon, marathon, quiz, debate etc. are conducted and add-on courses are offered to mould each student through personality development, including sessions on behavioral and social skill, so as to enable him/her to play his/her roles as a good citizen of this country.

The University has a dedicated Centre for Environmental Studies to sensitize the students to the emerging threats to the environment and to prevent them. Add on course is offered in this regard as prescribed by the UGC.

Involvement of the community in its outreach activities and contribution to community development by the University:

Wide spectrums of community based activities have been initiated to take healthcare education and health care delivery to the rural and outreach areas and thereby contribute to community development.

Centre for RHCD, Dept. of MSW, NSS, Youth Red Crossplay a major role to ensure the involvement of the community in these outreach activities. The starting of 29 sub-centres in outreach areas, starting of 09 dental peripheral centres, initiation of house to house health care delivery programme, initiation of health care on wheels programme, initiation of the training programme in family doctor system etc. stands eloquent testimony to the endeavors made by the University to ensure the involvement of the community in the outreach areas. The following activities are being carried out on a regular basis in the vicinity of the institution, surrounding areas of Dakshina Kannada and also neighbouring districts such as Hassan, Chickmagalur, Shivamogga, Davanagere, Chitradurga and Kasargod districts by the respective departments/ Institutions.

Department of Community Medicine:

The following activities are conducted:

- Razia Rural Health Care and Training Centre at Harekalais functioning under the supervision of department of Community Medicine of YMCH. This hospital is catering to the health needs of about 50,000 populations. Inpatient and outpatient facility, dental and physiotherapy services are made available to the public through this hospital. 750 families are covered under 100% free treatment facility at YMC Hospital in collaboration with Hydrose Haji Charitable Trust Harekala. Weekly clinics, health education, implementation of national programmes like pulse polio, malaria control, TB control, sanitation in selected clusters are conducted through this hospital.
- YMC has taken up an innovative programme of village adoption for total health care. Accordingly Kotepura ward of Ullal Municipality has been adopted where a sub centre under RHCD provides free health checkup facility for the community. Health education, immunization and school counseling services are also conducted. Dept. of Community Medicine supervises and monitors this programme by deputing its faculty, MBBS students and CRIs.

- Regular health check up in the two orphanages affiliated to Child Welfare Committee (CWC) of Dakshina Kannada.
- Urban Health Centre at Bunder Mangalore catering to the health needs of Bunder, Kudroli, and Bengare population through outpatient services, health camps, health education and implementation of national programmes.
- Rural postings of 4th, 6th, and 7th term MBBS students through Family Care Programme.
- Postings of PGs to conduct weekly clinics at Balepuni Satellite Centre.

Department of Public Health Dentistry:

Dept. Public health dentistry of YDC which is the key link between the college and the community has been undertaking number of dental health care programmes since the establishment of the YDC. Key programmes are

- Dental checkup and treatment camps in the community with support from local service organizations.
- School dental screening camps.
- Dental education programme through talks, video shows, posters and exhibitions.
- Rural Dental Satellite Centres with support from NGOs and Institutions.

Details of the extension activities are furnished under the section *Appendix 1 (I)*.

Department of Community Health Nursing:

The department administers rural postings of students in the selected villages at regular intervals. Health education, health screening camps and celebration of national programmes are being conducted through interdepartmental coordination.

Details of the extension activities are furnished under the section *Appendix 1 (J)*.

Yenepoya Physiotherapy College:

YPC plays a key role in extending physiotherapy activities in the village community through rural postings of students in the selected villages and shelter homes; health education, disability screening camps, free distribution of rehabilitative aides and celebration of national days with the involvement of students, interns and PGs.

The YPC runs physiotherapy clinics at Olavinahalli Social Service Centre for the benefit of the inmates of Old Age Home.

Rural health care and Development Centre (RHCD)

Yenepoya (Deemed to University) is implementing a separate project titled **RHCDP** in the vicinity of the campus. The following activities are conducted in the selected village clusters:

- Sub centers – regular health screening clinics
- Coordinating family focused health care by MBBS and BDS students
- Health education camps
- Celebration of national events
- Implementation of national programmes like pulse polio, malaria control, TB control, leprosy eradication etc.
- School health programme - health check up, counseling, health talks
- Health cards for unprivileged populations
- Conduct research studies on topics of significance

- Linkages with local governance bodies, NGOs and associations for issue based collaboration. Detailed list of the extension activities carried out by the RHCD during the year is enclosed as **Appendix 1 (L)**.

Department Medical Social Work :

- Coordination of camps – Medical, Dental, Ophthalmology, blood donation, diabetes detection in the semi urban and rural areas ongoing basis.
- Coordination of weekly clinics at Balepuni Satellite Centre
- Coordination of monthly health check up clinics in collaboration with District Family Welfare and Family Planning department of Dakshina Kannada and CHC Mudbidri for the Endosulphan affected families.
- Coordination of Yen-Sahayog initiative of YMCH to extend health care on free basis to Old Age homes, Psycho-Social Rehabilitation Centres and Residential schools. At present 56 NGOs, 4 residential schools and 9 Orphanage adoption Programs in Dakshina Kannada, Uttara Kannada, Kasargod and Kannur districts.
- Implementation of Blindness Control Programme in the 12 PHCs allotted by the District Blindness Control Society of District Health and Family Welfare department.
- Coordination of regular health check up in the four orphanages affiliated to Child Welfare Committee (CWC) of Dakshina Kannada.
- Rehabilitation support to needy patients and clients in the community through mobilizing local resources.
- Assistance in epidemic control and health education programmes conducted by colleges/departments of YU.
- Assistance in popularizing various patient friendly health programmes like Yen-Arogya in the community with the intention of reaching out to vulnerable sections in the society.

Details of the extension activities are furnished under the section Appendix 1 (F).

Department of Ophthalmology:

- Coordination of Blindness Control Programme in the 12 PHCs allotted by the District Blindness Control Society of District Health and Family Welfare department.
- Observance of days like World Sight Day, National Glaucoma Awareness week, National Eye Donation etc.
- Blindness screening for eye screening and diabetic retinopathy camps in the community.
- School Children Eye Screening camps
- Health Education.
- A MoU has been signed with DBCS and the Government supports this activity through reimburses cost of surgeries.

National Service Scheme Unit:

NSS has taken up national integration as a priority area and motivates the students to actively take part in the national integration camps. NSS also conducts cultural programmes in association with various national and international voluntary organizations like South Indian Cultural Centre, Folklore Academy, where artists from other parts of India come out with their native form of arts.

This year the NSS unit has organized more than 25 programs focused in the areas of cancer awareness, health check up camps, Youth exchange programs, self defense programs, observation of important days and a National Symposium on Cancer prevention and health promotion and early detection. Hundreds of students participated in various programs over the year from the State and other parts of the country. These activities are widely covered by the press and media due to its innovative nature and also greatly benefitted the society in terms of focused efforts towards health promotion and disease prevention. The activities of NSS is duly recognised by the Government and Non Government Agencies and following awards have been received for the same from the State Government:-

The details of programmes carried out during the last one year are enclosed as Appendix 1 (M).

- **KARA Seva:** A student initiative for early detection of common diseases in school children by medical undergraduates for screening the students in Government Schools who do not have access to quality health care. During the course of study the Students came across young children with conditions which could easily have been prevented if they had access to the right kind of medical attention. The condition of poor health of the students was reflected in their attendance in school and hence this activity was taken up for screening and prevention. KARA SEVA conducts health check-ups for the school children, talks on Hand washing techniques are demonstrated, talks on Menstrual Hygiene, General hygiene, Good touch and bad touch are given. Management of medical emergencies are delivered. Recycling and reusing the various wastes to create social responsibility is also explained to the students. For the period 2017-18 the students have visited 18 schools and conducted the screening. The total number of students screened are 2326 out of which 347 students have been treated in our hospital.

The various activities also include:

DHRITI: Recreational activities are conducted at orphanages and old age homes in the months of March to May

EPIPHANY: A activity where waste papers are collected from the teaching, non teaching staff and students of the University and used for recycling.

A Memorandum of Understanding has been entered by Kara Seva and Rural Health Care and Development Centre of Yenepoya (Deemed to be University). Financial assistance of Rs.10,000/- per month is being given by the University.

Overall development of students:

Mentorship programme: Under the mentorship programme, a group of 15 to 20 students belonging to both Urban and Rural areas and belonging to different communities are brought under a faculty mentor. The mentor identifies the academic, and social and the language gaps found between the rural and urban areas bridge courses are conducted. The University has also started an add-on course READY programme, for the holistic development of the students, which directly promotes the overall development of students from rural and tribal backgrounds. The students from rural backgrounds are provided free seats, free accommodation, free food, book bank facility, empowerment programmes and employment after accomplishment of degree and entrepreneurship placement through UIIC.

Social-justice:

Samraksha: To promote social justice and good citizenship among the students, University initiated a programme namely Samrakshato motivate the students to develop the right attitude towards the less privileged sections of the society. Samrakshamobilizes funds in different ways to the needy patients seeking services of YMCH. The fund mobilization was first started in the hostels by bucket collection method at hostel and registered as charitable organization in 2003. Apart from the benefit to the patients the Samraksha also promotes feeling of social justice and good citizenship among its students.

Training on Family doctor system: Under this programme clusters of students are made in-charge of clusters of families living in the rural and outreach areas. Apart from catering to the health care requirements of these families the programme could inculcate a feeling of brotherhood with the poorest of the poor leaving in the villages of India and could season them to respond positively in meeting the health care requirements of these people and thereby promoting their sense of social justice and good citizenship.

Centre for RHCD: Through the activities of the centre namely health care on wheels, door to door health care delivery programme etc. the students are sensitized to the health care challenges faced in the rural population of India and thereby promoting social justice and good citizenship among them.

Dept. of MSW conducts various types of camps in the rural areas which are specifically connected with the extension programmes of various departments of Ophthalmology, Paediatrics etc. They also take the students and familiarize them to the sad conditions in which the rural populations of India live.

Substance Free Campus: University has declared the campus as totally substance free and created a dedicated centre namely, Centre for Substance Abuse Prevention. The centre has conducted 12 awareness programmes against various substances like alcohol, tobacco and drugs. Placards are displayed in the campus with slogans of preventing tobacco and alcohol in the campus and this is being strictly implemented with the help of mentors and faculty.

Institutional alignment itself with the annual themes/programs of WHO/ICMR/UGC:

University has made it a regular practice to observe various days on relevant health themes like World Aids Day, World Health Day, Mental Health Day and Week, No Tobacco Day, Doctors Day, Yoga Day, International Flag day, World Nursing Day, Breast feeding week, Nutrition week etc. There is a theme associated with each day and week. University arranges panel discussions and invited lectures on these themes and takes up the challenges in the themes for further follow-up.

Several students and faculty projects are undertaken in the thematic areas outlined by ICMR/UGC.

Role of the institution in the following extension activities

*** Community outreach health programs for prevention, detection, screening, management of diseases and rehabilitation by cost effective interventions:**

The routine programmes consisting of awareness creation programme, screening/detection camps, treatment camps, immunization camps, and rehabilitation endeavours and unique programmes like door to door health care delivery programme, health care on wheels, immunization programme, training programme on family doctor system, Health Card distribution, are meant for prevention, detection, screening, management of diseases and rehabilitation totally free of cost or provided at highly subsidized rates. These services can be described as cost effective.

- Awareness creation regarding potable water supply, sanitation and nutrition.
- Awareness creation regarding water-borne and air-borne communicable diseases.
- Awareness creation regarding non-communicable diseases - cardiovascular diseases, diabetes, cancer, mental health, accident and trauma, etc.
- Awareness creation regarding the role of healthy life styles and physical exercise for promotion of health and prevention of diseases.
- Awareness creation has always been an integral part of our extension activities carried out by different agencies of the University.
- Awareness creation regarding AYUSH Systems of medicines in general and / or any system of medicine in particular.
- Complementary and alternative medicine.
- Pharmaco economic evaluation in drug utilization.

Yenepoya (Deemed to be University) has been so far running academic programmes on modern medicine, nursing and allied health sciences. But, now the University has considered the possibility of diversifying the areas of specialization to the systems of Alternative medicine as well. Accordingly, University has approved Yenepoya Homeopathic and Medical College Hospital and Yenepoya Ayurveda College and Hospital at its extended campus located at Naringana Village, Kinya. Several awareness programmes have been conducted for our faculty and students on the alternative systems of medicine. In addition to awareness creation, our academic departments and University research center has been conducting some integrated research programmes. A separate faculty of Ayurveda and faculty of Homeopathy have been created to facilitate the establishment of AYUSH courses and Hospital.

Hospital information system covers entire hospital including the pharmacy. Periodic evaluation of the drug utilization from Pharmaco-economic point of view is undertaken to make the treatment cost effective. A drug policy including antibiotic policy has been evolved by the hospital administration and a drug formulary has been created with cost effective and high quality brands of all important molecules. The department of Hospital Administration makes a systematic review on the judicious utilization of the drugs using the data available through the Hospital Information Systems periodically.

- **Participation in national programs like Family Welfare, Mother and Child Welfare, Population Control, Immunization, HIV/AIDS, Blindness control, Malaria, Tuberculosis, School Health, anti-tobacco campaigns, oral health care, etc. and Promotion of mental health and prevention of substance abuse.**

University has taken extra care to extend the medical education and health care delivery to the community and the family level. In that process importance is given to implement National Health Programmes like Family Welfare, Mother and Child Welfare etc. In fact the unique programmes initiated as beyond the syllabus academic activity is a training programme on the Family Doctor System to groom the next generation of health care providers well trained on family doctor system, which is the only method of ensuring health care delivery and welfare at the family level including mother and child welfare. University centres like centre for Rural Health Care and Development and Department of Medical Social Work along with the academic departments like ophthalmology, dermatology, OBG, General Medicine, Chest Medicine etc. all play their due roles in the implementation of National Health Programmes like Blindness control, HIV AIDS, Malaria, TB, and Population Control etc. The Center for Rural Health Care Development and Dept. of MSW along with Paediatrics and Pedodontics conduct regular dental and general health check-ups in different schools, destitute homes, orphanages etc. Anti-tobacco campaigns is one the main programmes adopted by the Center for Prevention of Substance Abuse. University has established 9 dental peripheral health care centres apart from various camps conducted in other areas as mentioned. As recognition to our commitment towards oral health care the Head of the department of Public Health Dentistry has been chosen by the Govt. of Karnataka as the special officer to evolve a comprehensive oral health policy for Govt. of Karnataka.

Mental health remains to be one of the major challenges to be addressed in the field of health care delivery. While the indicators related to the physical health have all shown improvement, mental health has been deteriorated. While physical health problems like infant mortality, maternal mortality, problems due to infectious diseases etc. are faced by developing countries, mental health issues are the burning problems in the developed world. University has already recognized the increased incidences of mental health problems in the society and has evolved different programmes and personnel to handle the additional burden in addition to the functioning of the mandatory department of Psychiatry. The department of Psychiatry has a clinical psychology branch that handles patients with a spectrum of mental health problems below the level of psychiatric illness. The department of Paediatrics also has a Child Psychology wing headed by a highly acclaimed faculty in psychology. All these units conduct several awareness programmes apart from offering counselling sessions in consultation with qualified psychiatrist in the psychiatry department. Already the department has PG and doctoral programmes in Psychiatry and related areas. Now the department has come out with a new post- doctoral certificate programme on Psychiatric rehabilitation in collaboration NIMHANS Bangalore.

It has been observed that one of the worst problems that the present generation faces is the mental health problems associated with the substance abuse and addiction. The peaceful atmosphere of the educational institutions is often adversely affected by a small group of students who are habituated or addicted to the substances, including alcohol and drugs. Understanding the need of the time, University took a policy decision to create a dedicated centre to create awareness and thereby to prevent substance abuse. **The Center for Prevention of Substance Abuse** has conducted several awareness programmes. The Center has declared the University campus as substance free campus. The details of the programmes organized by this Centre are enclosed as **Appendix 1 (N)**.

Environmental Consciousness: University has been meticulously orienting our students to become environment conscious through various programmes organized by University Centre for Environmental studies. Accordingly several awareness programmes on Global Warming, Waste disposal including solid waste disposal, liquid waste disposal, and bio-medical waste disposal. University has elaborate facility to handle this waste and minimize the impact. The Liquid wastes are treated through STP and ETP and the effluent water after treatment is used for Gardening and Flushing purposes. The solid waste, after outsourcing the biomedical waste for disposal, all other waste including organic waste including food waste, garbage, dry leaves are subjected to vermi-composting and the compost is distributed for agriculture purposes. In this way we have already proved to our students that nothing can be considered as waste and the so called waste if properly collected and treated can be recycled effectively. Special classes are arranged by the Centre for Environmental Studies on all these aspects. The centre also conducts green auditing of the campus systematically collecting the spectrum of flora and fauna in the campus in which the students take an active role.

To make sure that the personality of the student imbibes all the qualities of the good citizen, university conducts a unique programme called Ready programme, where interactive sessions are conducted by experts to impart all the qualities of the good citizenship into the young minds.

The Student Welfare Department and the NSS units conduct special programmes on national integration, value system, human rights etc. apart from conducting various cultural programmes to strengthen the affective domain of the student with deliberate intention of molding them into ideal and good citizens of tomorrow.

To create intimacy and affection to the suffering patients, from the second year onwards specific number of beds are allotted to each student who prepares his case for presentation before the faculty and at the same time groom them into matured health care provider with the qualities of an ideal citizen/doctor.

All such activities are planned and executed with wholehearted cooperation of faculty and other staff.

- **Adoption of population in the geographical area for total health care:**

As an institution deemed to be University situated in the Village panchayath, University has taken up the responsibility of reaching a target of health for all in the geographical areas surrounding the University by 2020. To achieve this target at the inception itself University has created a dedicated centre that established 38 sub-centres in these areas and adopted 12 villages

for total health care.

- **Research or extension work to reach out to marginalized populations.**

All the extension activities are carried out by various units of the University namely, Centre for Rural Health Care and Development, Department of Medical Social Work, NSS, Community Departments, YRC etc. are aimed at marginalized populations living in the rural and outreach areas. Now the Centre for Rural Health Care and Development has come out with various community based research programs on communicable and non- communicable diseases in collaboration with the Community Medicine department of the University.

Participation of faculty members in community health awareness programs:

Faculty plays the most important role as resource persons and organizers in the various types of community health awareness programmes regularly.

Institutional participation in National program for prevention and control of diseases:

Yenepoya (Deemed to be University) through its constituent institutions takes active participation in the implementation of national programmes for prevention and control of diseases. This is done mainly through awareness generation programmes and extending services through opening of government supported patient support units in the YMCH. Such units include:

DOTS: is a community programme of prevention and treatment of Tuberculosis. The unit is managed by the Department of Pulmonary Medicine. The patients are being referred from Primary Health Centers in and around Mangalore.

District Tuberculosis Center- Collaborates with Dept. of Pulmonary Medicine for the implementation of the RNTCP, Govt. of India. Students are regularly posted to the RNTCP unit that provides exposure to a spectrum of Tuberculosis related problems like MDRTB and XDRTB.

Integrated Counseling and Testing Centre: (ICTC)

Under the supervision of District Health and family Care Officer is functioning in the Dept. of OBG providing testing and counseling services for prevention of HIV transmission from mother to child. ICTC also conducts awareness programme for the general public.

Immunization clinics:

Departments of Peadiatrics and Community Medicine conduct free immunization clinics (DPT, BCG, Polio etc.) both in the tertiary care hospital as well as in the rural and urban health centers.

Extension of services during epidemic outbreak:

Yenepoya Medical College is an active collaborator with District Health and Family Welfare Department striving for the control of diseases during epidemic outbreaks (dengue, malaria, chikungunya etc.) in the district. Health education, blood smear test, clinics are part of such interventions.

Blindness control:

Dept. of Ophthalmology with support from Dept. of MSW conducts regular eye screening camps in the remote villages as part of national blindness control programme. Recognizing this service District Blindness Control Society has allotted 12 PHCs to YMCH for organizing eye screening camps with support from the respective PHCs and to perform cataract surgeries on patients identified through these camps in the Yenepoya Medical College and Hospital tertiary care hospital.

In addition to this awareness is created on importance of eye donation during the eye donation awareness fortnight observed from August 25th to September 8th every year.

- ❖ Speaking at an interaction with media persons here at Mangalore Vibhu Krishna from Almora District of Uttarakhand said that Uttarakhand is a hilly area with extreme cold weather throughout the year. We were excited to get a glimpse of beaches in Mangaluru. A journey by train too has been a new experience. A visit to Bengaluru looked like we are visiting a new country, we loved Kambala in Mangaluru instead of Roti and Dal, and we have started liking idly, Sambar Dosa and Vada.
- ❖ **They said “The Youth Exchange Programme”** has helped us to show case the rich heritage and culture, customs and traditions of the state enabling people to understand and appreciated the diversity of India.
- ❖ They are stating that there are no job opportunities in Uttarakhand. She said that there are ample opportunities in Karnataka. The Youth clubs in Dakshina Kannada are over 50 years old while in our state it’s hardly four to five years old. Because of the industries in the region the youth clubs get CSR funds to sustain as well. Further, Gram Panchayat buildings in Dakshina Kannada have good buildings, which is absent in our native,
- ❖ She said that Uttarakhand lags behind sector as well. People have to travel for a long distance to avail health care facilities.
- ❖ For CS Danu, the people of Mangaluru are friendly and cooperative as they attempted to converse with them in Hindi unlike other South Indian states like Tamil Nadu. He felt that corruption is rampant in Gram Panchayats in Uttarakhand.
- ❖ For Rachana, “The weather in Mangaluru made her wonder how she will survive with this humidity. Now she is adjusted to it. People respect each other in Mangaluru, which they liked a lot”.

Yenepoya Deemed to be University has launched the Cancer Awareness Outreach Programme in the year 2016 January under the leadership of Hon’ble Vice Chancellor Dr. M Vijayakumar Onco-Surgeon.

- The Vice Chancellor with his team has taken initiative to train 135 NSS Programme Officers,
- 13,500 NSS volunteers, 2500 ASHA and Anganwadi workers,
- 2500 Nursing Students, around 300 School Teachers and more than 2000 Public in the past 2 years.
- We have conducted an impact analyses of the ASHA & Anganwadi training programme held at Udupi districts.

There are 7 languages the CD Has been made in Hindi Kannada, English, Konkani, Tulu, Malayalam, beary and CD which will contain celebrity messages, short movie acted By NSS COORDINATOR and NSS Programme Officers enacted on early detection of cancer, Slides on symptoms and signs, treatment aspect approach towards Govt schemes etc

This CD will serve multipurpose requirement for the public .Our target is to equip them with valuable information related to early detection of the cancer. Complimentary copies distributed to all the NSS Volunteers and registered organization where they will be able to display at the special camp site and in villages during some programmes. 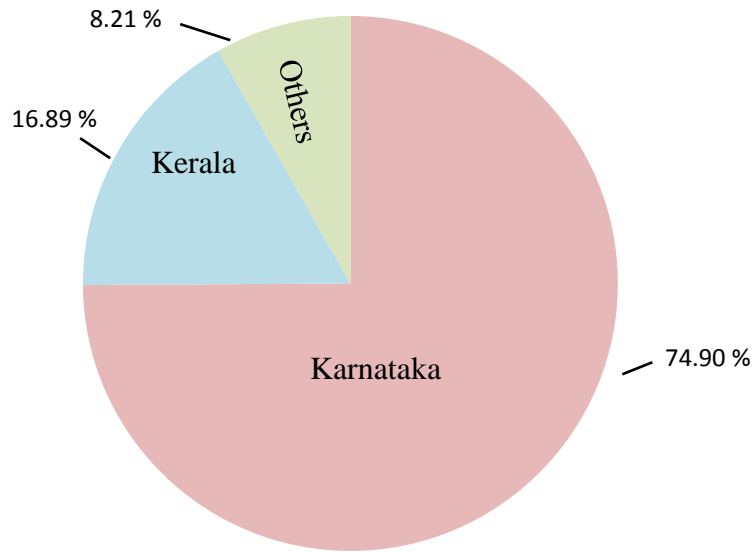

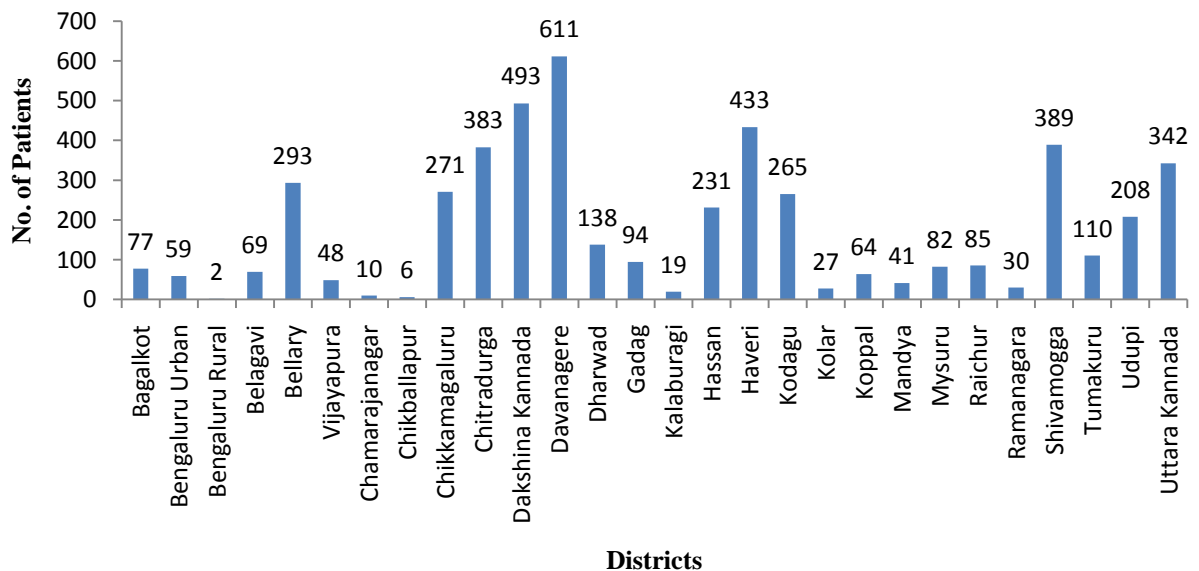

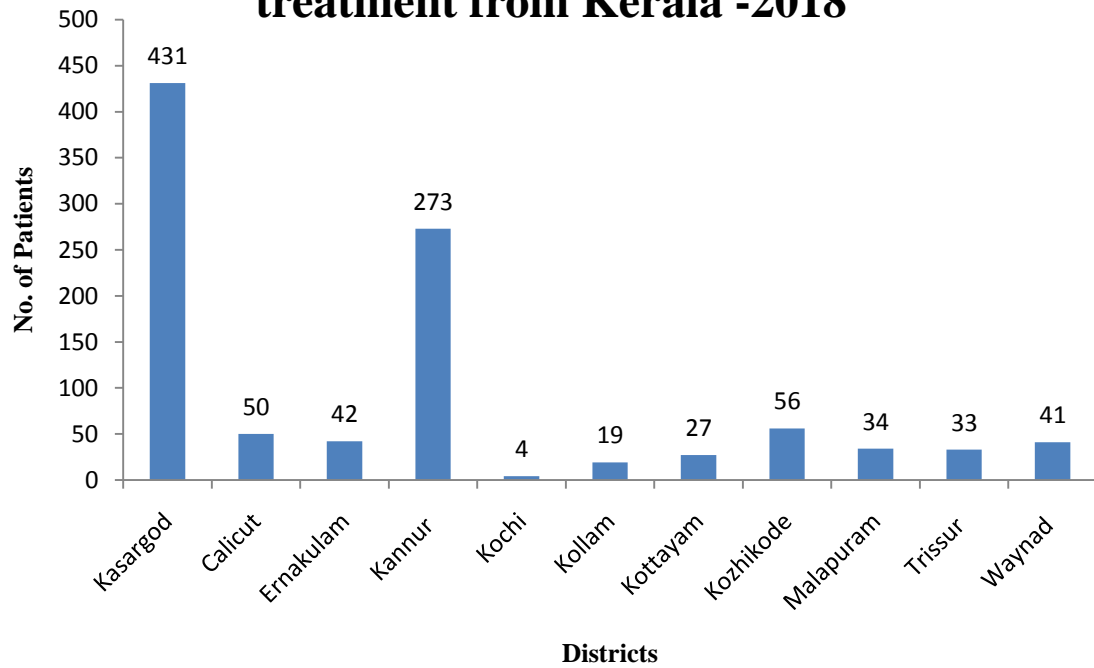
District wise Patients who underwent treatment through YEN MITHRA -2018
