1. Background and Purpose

- Encourage meaningful **youth participation in national development** initiatives.
- Expose Indian youth to **global best practices and leadership** paradigms.
- Promote **cross-sectoral and international partnerships** led by youth.
- Identify and nurture **youth-driven solutions** to challenges in climate change, public health, inclusive development, and peacebuilding.

5.1 Social Entrepreneurship and Innovation

Mr. Suchith Sindhe, an inspiring youth entrepreneur and advocate for sustainable agriculture, opened the thematic sessions with a powerful address on the role of **social entrepreneurship in shaping a resilient and inclusive economy**. Drawing from his personal journey of building an award-winning agribusiness, he highlighted how **youth-led enterprises** can generate employment, address food insecurity, and promote environmental sustainability.

Key Takeaways:

- Agribusiness offers a scalable model for both urban and rural youth.
- Social enterprises can fill critical gaps in supply chains and empower local communities.
- Government schemes and incubators must prioritize youth-run ventures, especially in sustainable farming and food tech.

Mr. Sindhe also showcased success stories of young entrepreneurs mentored under his initiative, emphasizing that with the right support, **entrepreneurship can be an effective tool for social change**.

5.2 Green India: Youth-led Climate Action

Speaker: *Dr. Anil Kumar*, Assistant Professor, National Institute of Technology, Calicut

Addressing the pressing climate emergency, Dr. Anil Kumar delivered a compelling session on how **youth can take the lead in building a greener India**. He emphasized the importance of **climate literacy** among students and volunteers and called for urgent, community-based actions that can help mitigate the environmental crisis.

Key Highlights:

- Strategies to achieve **carbon neutrality** at the institutional and community level.
- Youth-led **tree plantation drives**, climate clubs, and eco-sustainable innovations.
- Integration of climate education into NSS and school/college curriculums.

Dr. Kumar applauded the efforts of grassroots volunteers involved in beach clean-ups, waste management, and biodiversity preservation and urged youth to become **climate ambassadors in their localities**.

5.3 Empowering Rural Youth for Inclusive Development

Speaker: *Mr. Kunal*, Rural Development Practitioner & Policy Consultant

Mr. Kunal's session focused on **bridging the urban-rural development gap** through innovation, skill-building, and inclusive policies. With extensive experience in working with underserved communities, he emphasized the need

to equip rural youth with digital and entrepreneurial skills to participate in India's growth story.

Core Focus Areas:

- Establishing **grassroots innovation hubs** in rural areas through partnerships with universities and NGOs.
- Promoting **digital literacy**, e-commerce, and mobile-based learning platforms.
- Scaling **women-led Self-Help Groups (SHGs)** to build financial independence and leadership skills.

Mr. Kunal showcased real-life case studies from Karnataka and North-East India where youth transformed their villages through **technology**,

agriculture, and community leadership, demonstrating how decentralized models of development can be both inclusive and effective. These three keynote sessions collectively set the foundation for a powerful summit narrative — placing youth at the center of sustainable development, economic resilience, and climate justice. Each session concluded with engaging Q&A rounds, where delegates shared their perspectives and committed to replicating ideas within their communities.

Theme: *Empowering Youth for Sustainable Development, Innovation, and Global Leadership*

1. Youth in Governance and Policy Making

Speaker: Mr. R.M.V. Milinda Rajapaksha (Sri Lanka)

Position: Presidential Spokesperson and Political Youth Leader, Sri Lanka

Mr. Rajapaksha brought in a compelling international perspective on the **critical need for youth involvement in governance and political processes**. Drawing upon his own journey in political communication and grassroots mobilization in Sri Lanka, he emphasized the necessity of engaging young people beyond electoral cycles.

Key Points Discussed:

- **Electoral Literacy and Participation:** He emphasized the role of youth in ensuring clean, informed, and inclusive elections by becoming not just voters but also *watchdogs and mobilizers* of democracy.
- **Youth Councils and Policy Forums:** Citing best practices from Sri Lanka and South Asia, he encouraged the formation of *state-supported youth parliaments* and policy internships in government departments.

- **Bridging Generational Gaps:** Mr. Rajapaksha discussed how youth need not wait for leadership roles to influence change—they can work as policy researchers, communicators, and civil society advocates.

Takeaway: Youth must be trained in political literacy, dialogue facilitation, and public accountability. Karnataka can pioneer *district-level youth governance forums* that mirror this model.

2. Building a Healthy Nation: Youth and Public Health

Speaker: Aravind S., Public Health Educator, Tatvam Institute

This session addressed the urgent need to engage youth as **frontline health advocates**, especially in the aftermath of the COVID-19 pandemic and rising mental health challenges among students.

Focus Areas:

- **Preventive Healthcare Awareness:** Aravind emphasized low-cost interventions like community health screenings, menstrual hygiene awareness, and nutritional education.

- **Digital Mental Wellness:** Youth-specific platforms and mobile apps were presented that offer anonymous, culturally relevant support for anxiety, depression, and exam stress.
- **Youth Health Ambassadors:** The concept of *peer-to-peer health champions* was promoted, encouraging trained students to lead wellness initiatives in their own institutions.

Takeaway: Public health must be integrated into NSS and NYK activities, with youth trained not only as beneficiaries but as **health educators and change catalysts**.

4. From Students to Startup Leaders

Speaker: Mr. Asim, CEO, Yenepoya Technology Incubation Centre (YTIC)

Mr. Asim's session was both **inspirational and practical**, mapping the journey of a student with a raw idea to becoming a **startup founder supported by institutional ecosystems**.

Key Insights:

- **Ideation to Prototyping:** He stressed the need to identify real-world problems, validate them with user feedback, and build prototypes with minimal investment.
- **Incubation and Mentorship:** The YTIC model was explained, detailing how student startups receive workspace, legal support, financial literacy, and mentorship under one roof.
- **Funding Avenues:** A walkthrough was given on securing early-stage grants, participating in pitch competitions, and understanding seed investment basics.

Real-World Impact: Several NSS youth showed interest in submitting their innovations to the upcoming university hackathons and incubation calls.

Takeaway: Entrepreneurial leadership can be cultivated at the undergraduate level through structured mentorship, peer networking, and exposure to startup ecosystems.

Overall Reflections on Thematic Sessions:

These sessions collectively advanced the summit's objective of **building an empowered, informed, and innovation-driven youth force**. By covering governance, technology, health, and entrepreneurship, Day 2 sessions offered holistic insights into shaping youth as **nation-builders with a global mindset**.

8. Panel Discussion 2: International Youth Collaboration

Theme: *Bridging Borders: Strengthening Youth Collaboration for a Shared Future*

Date: 6th June 2025

Session Objective:

To explore avenues of international collaboration among youth towards achieving Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs), promoting intercultural understanding, and leveraging digital tools for global impact.

Session Highlights:

This panel brought together thought leaders and practitioners from Africa, South Asia, and Eastern Europe to deliberate on how youth can be central actors in cross-border cooperation. Moderated by the organizing committee, the discussion began with the recognition that the world is more interconnected than ever, and youth have a unique opportunity to become global change-makers through strategic collaboration.

Key Discussion Points:

1. **Global South Solidarity:**

Mr. William Acquah stressed the importance of partnerships among developing countries in the Global South. He presented successful youth exchange initiatives that linked Ghanaian volunteers with Indian and Thai organizations for rural development, social entrepreneurship, and environmental conservation. His proposal for a "**South-South Youth Innovation Fellowship**" was widely appreciated.

2. **Youth Diplomacy and Cultural Exchange:**

Dr. Devin Dangolle emphasized how Sri Lanka has built strong youth councils and leadership academies that prepare young people to participate in international policy forums and peace missions. He called for **mutual cultural exchange** programs where Indian and Sri Lankan students could work together on coastal conservation and disaster preparedness.

3. **Digital Platforms for Collaboration:**

Ms. Leila Badalova focused on the use of **AI, social media, and virtual mentorship** to enhance transnational youth engagement. She encouraged the adoption of tools such as collaborative apps, online incubators, and remote training to connect young innovators across borders, especially in underserved regions.

4. **Intercultural Understanding as a Peacebuilding Tool:**

All panelists agreed that fostering **empathy, intercultural literacy, and global citizenship** is critical. Leila shared her personal journey working in post-conflict communities and how storytelling can dismantle stereotypes.

Outcome & Proposals:

- A roadmap for **Global South Youth Partnership** was proposed, focusing on climate resilience, entrepreneurship, and education.
- The panel encouraged setting up a **Youth SDG Innovation Portal** to share best practices and co-develop solutions.
- Proposal to initiate **India-Ghana-Sri Lanka-Russia Youth Labs** under institutional MoUs.

9. Panel Discussion 3: Youth Innovation in Peacebuilding

Theme: *From Conflict to Collaboration – Redefining Peacebuilding Through Youth Leadership*

Date: 6th June 2025

Objective:

To engage academic thinkers and youth activists in a conversation about youth-led peacebuilding, conflict resolution, and cultural harmony initiatives, both at the grassroots and policy levels.

Session Highlights:

This intellectual session served as a convergence of academic insight and field experience, focusing on how the principles of **non-violence, dialogue, and cultural inclusivity** can be embedded into youth programs and educational institutions.

Key Insights:

- 1. Gandhian Philosophy in Modern Peacebuilding:**
Dr. Krishna highlighted the continued relevance of **Gandhian values of Satyagraha and non-violence** in modern youth movements. He emphasized that peace is not just the absence of conflict but the presence of justice and inclusion. His call for youth to become "**Peace Innovators**" was met with overwhelming applause.
- 2. Education as a Tool for Harmony:**
Prof. S.Y. Surendra Kumar presented models from Bangalore University where peace education has been integrated into coursework. He suggested the introduction of "**Peace Literacy Modules**" in all higher

education institutions in Karnataka to sensitize students to issues of caste, religion, and regional identity.

3. **Grassroots Dialogue Platforms:**

Prof. Illias Hussain shared and encouraged partnerships between universities and NGOs to implement these initiatives in training of peace modules at rural areas.

4. **Youth Clubs as Peace Hubs:**

Dr. Ziyauddin proposed the idea of setting up "**Youth Peace Circles**" in universities and colleges. These circles would serve as safe spaces where students from diverse backgrounds engage in structured dialogue, cultural exchange, and joint community service projects.

Outcome & Recommendations:

- Adoption of **Youth Peace Circles** across all universities in Karnataka as a pilot project under the Department of Youth Empowerment & Sports.
- Recommendation to include **Peacebuilding and Conflict Resolution** as an NSS elective.
- Proposal for an **annual Youth Peace Conclave** hosted by Yenepoya University, focusing on interfaith and intercultural harmony.

Conclusion:

Both panels underscored that **youth are not only beneficiaries but also architects of peaceful and collaborative futures**. The discussions translated into actionable frameworks, institutional proposals, and international bridges, aligning with Karnataka's vision for youth-led innovation and global leadership.

11. Cultural Gala and Valedictory Dinner

The final evening was a **celebration of youth solidarity**, with performances representing Karnataka's folk traditions, African tribal beats, Russian folk dance, and South Indian classical forms. Delegates departed with a renewed commitment to collaborative change-making.
